GEORGE WINTER SANBORN,

EXPLORER OF THE SOUTH PACIFIC

George Winter Sanborn once explored caves and traveled in remote areas of the South Pacific. He uncovered a legendary Hawaiian burial cave when he was only 19, just after sailing the Pacific as captain's mess attendant on the windjammer *Lansing*. He returned about 9 or 10 years later according to his brother who said he didn't even know he had a brother until he was 15 or 16.

Subsequent explorations led to discoveries in New Zealand, Australia, the Fiji Islands, Midway and the Antipodes. He lectured in the United States on his cave discoveries and the burial paraphernalia he found in them. He was an authority on the lives and customs of natives.

At one time 80 radio stations carried his lectures. The Hawaiian cave discovery always topped the list of his stories. In 1900, after weeks of searching and probing the brush on Hawaii he found the volcanic Kanaena Cave by probing with a 30 foot pole at the base of a 1,000 foot cliff. The entrance was only three feet square and there was a jungle of vegetation just twenty feet in back of it. Its name Kanaena, meaning "pray to the gods" was given by the Hawaiian government. When he entered the cave he found a beam of light emanating from atop the cliff, casting a dim light down a shaft. He became know as "Cave Man Sanborn".

George W. Sanborn was born in Cambridge MA in 1882 and first sailed the seas from San Francisco when he was 18 years old. In 1926 he and wife Clara sailed to Australia and New Zealand where he showed his wife the sites of some of his discoveries and adventures. *He was the s/o George Otis (VCS #526i) 1856 Middlesex VT - 1929 Pasadena CA and Annie Maude (Winter) 1860 Frederickton NB - 1935 Oakland CA. George, 3 Nov 1882 Cambridge MA - 8 Jan 1965 Novato CA, m 10 Jul 1902 at Seligman AZ to Clara May SIMMS b 9 Jul 1880 Effingham IL - 19 Oct 1965 Novato. Their son, George Herbert b 1903 at Oakland, d 1972 at Hawthorne CA, m 1926 at Santa Ana CA to Norita Laurine IRWIN of Prescott AZ d/o William Norman and Juanita Ella (SMITH).*

Marilyn Arline Sanborn, b 1929 Los Angeles CA is the d/o George Herbert and Norita, is married to Robert Alan Gwartney, and lives in Corona CA.

**NEW HAMPSHIRE NAME
 & WHENCE IT CAME**

SANBORNTON - This town was originally named Sanborntown, after John Sanborn, a close friend of New Hampshire's first provincial Gov. Benning Wentworth. Granted in 1748, it was one of the first four towns to be given a charter following the purchase fo the colonial lands from the Mason claim by the Portsmouth proprietors in that year.

Out of the 60 individuals wo were given land under this gran, 12 wer Sanborns, all descended from Sambueren or Sambourne, whose family came to America from English towns with such picturesque names as Timsbury, Nunney, Miadens Newton and Turner's Puddle. The first Sanborns were sons of Ann Bachiler, daughter of the Rev. Stephen Bachiler, famous in New Hampshire history.

The early settlers of Sanbornton included the Danforths, Copps, Foggs, Fifields, Shepards, Dustins and Rowans, the entire settlement coming from the towns of Hampton, Exeter, Stratham, and Chester. At

the time of the French wars a fort was built at "Union" Bridge, now Sanbornton Bridge, where the Colonial Army under Col. Theodore Atkinson was stationed in "Winter Quearters" for the duration of the "Canada Expedition" in 1746. The town was officially incorporated by Gov. John Wentworth in 1770.

The town of Sanbornton (Belknap County, NH) had its beginnings in 1748 when 60 residents of early NH towns petitioned that they be granted "a part of the land which is to be laied out intow townships in our frontier above". The land lay on the "E.N.E. side of Pemisigwaset River, above Winepisock River, near the crotch of said rivers". The name "Sanborn Town" derived from the circumstance that twelve of the 60 original grantees bore the Sanborn name. By 1764, the first nine settlers were clearing their lands and seven families were living there in 1766. By 1770, there were 40 families and a petition for a charter of incorporation was submitted to His Excellency John Wentworth, Governor of the Province of New Hampshire. On March 1, 1770, the petition was granted in the name of King George III and the 40 families became "a body Politick and Corporate, to have continuance forever, by the name of Sanbornton".

The new town experienced vigorous growth during its first 50 years. The two rivers afforded ample power supplies for the mills and shops which grew up along their banks and by 1820, the town's population had grown to 3,329. By 1825, it had become the third largest town in New Hampshire but a few years thereafter there occurred the first of two actions by the state legislature which were to affect profoundly the town and its future growth. In 1829, in spite of Sanbornton's opposition, the industrial area along the ox-bow of the "Winnipiseogee River" was taken from Sanbornton and combined with parts of Northfield, Andover and Salisbury Village to create the new town of Franklin. The resultant loss of some 500 inhabitants reduced the Sanbornton population to 2,866 in 1830. In 1869, the legislature in similar manner took away the industrial area which had grown up along the north bank of the river in the Sanbornton Bridge section of the town and set it up as the town of Tilton. With this second loss of industry and population, Sanbornton became a farming community of 1,236 souls. By the time of the 1920 census, its population had fallen to 617.

During the past 50 years, Sanbornton has attracted increasing numbers of summer residents who appreciate and enjoy the peace and quiet of this rural

community and the natural beauty of its fields and streams. In wooded hills and modest mountains and in shore line on beautiful Lake Winnisquam. Many, including a number of college and university faculty members, have purchased sturdily built old houses and have lovingly and carefully restored them for summer and retirement homes. The year round population of 946 (2,136 in 1992) is augmented by nearly twice that many summer residents, a trend which has been further encouraged by two factors: zoning regulations and town planning were adopted by Sanbornton some years ago and the town has become easily accessible from Boston with the extension of Interstate Rte. 93 through it. An attractive and much used rest and recreation area on its southbound lanes is at the site of the Sanbornton Boulder, one of the largest glacial boulders to be seen in the state.

The reverse side of the Sanbornton Commemorative Medal sums up this town history by means of a map showing the the 1748 grant, with shaded areas representing the parts taken to make Franklin and Tilton. The sentiment of the townsfolk today is expressed in Latin by the aphorism: "Pars Optima Oppidi Manet" or "The Best part of the Town Remains". The obverse side of the medal depicts the Woodman Sanbornton Academy, one of the town's oldest buildings. Built in the town square in 1825, its name distinguished it from the Sanbornton Academy already established in the Sanbornton Bridge section of town and which is now Tilton School. Woodman Sanbornton Academy was a private school until 1858, after which it served many years as Sanbornton's public grammar school. As Academy Hall, it now houses the Sanbornton public library.

These Bicentennial Medals (1770-1970) are being offered in a limited edition of 25 medalettes in 14 karat gold at \$100 each; a serially numbered edition of 500 medals in sterling silver at \$10 each; and unnumbered antique bronze medals at \$2.50.

The Sanbornton Town Crier - volume 1, issue 1, 1995 mentions that Sanbornton has a portion of the future *Massachusetts border to the Canadian Heritage Trail*, and covers probably the most scenic portion of all the trail presently in use. Our portion starts in Franklin and follows the flood control reservoir for most its length to New Hampton, the main access of the trail is at the end of Shaw Hill Road adjacent to the Transfer Station. It follows the old historic road past the ferry crossing and Belknap Bridge site that used to cross into Hill and beyond. The trail travels thru a

forest of pine and hemlock and follows the yellow blazes passing the Pemigewasset River, south along ravines to a bluff outlook high above the river where can be seen to the west Mt. Kearsarge. The trail is approximately 2.5 miles to Franklin and 3.5 miles to New hampton from Shaw Hill Road along the river.

Miss Kate A. Sanborn, (see article on her in last issue SS) a dau. of Prf. E. D. Sanborn of Dartmouth College and widely known as a lady of rare literary attainments, is to deliver a lecture in the Congretational Church next Tuesday evening, January 7 (1879). Her subject is "Newspaper Wits". Miss Sanborn has delivered a course of lectures in Boston and new York with great success and her commendations are of the highest character. She has generously offered to give the proceeds of the lecture to the benefit of the Orphan's Home, situated upon the early home of Daniel Webster, her great uncle. Thus the opportunity is afforded to hear a fine lecture and at the same time benefit a most worthy charity. Hon. G. W. Nesmith will preside. There will be an organ concert at 7 o'clock. Lecture at 7:30. Admission is 25 cents; children 15 cents. Tickets may be had at either post office (Franklin has 2 post offices to this day!). Conveyance from Burleigh Block to church for 15 cents, at 7 o'clock. The Orphan's Home was later named the Daniel Webster Home. Sisters of the Holy Cross (Catholic) purchased it and ran a kindergarten and pre-school classes until about 10 years ago. Presently it is a retirement home for nuns. - Milly Shaw.

Taking his handkerchief he bound it up so as to be able to go a short distance, but fell upon the field, where the various tides of the battle left him among friends and foes alternately, in the excitement of the battle receiving help from none; after a few hours was removed to a bed of straw on the ground near by, remaining 'till the next day without food or drink, when his wound was dressed; five days after sent to Washington and remained there 'till the 2nd of December, sent to Burlington; returned to his regiment the first of March '63, and followed his fortunes through the campaign of '63, when, not disheartened by the bloody scenes through which he had passed, he reenlisted Dec. 21, 1863 for another term of service. Starting in the campaign of '64, in the advance towards Richmond, he fought in the first four battles of his company, but at Colt Harbor, June 3rd, while skirmishing, was again hit by a ball from a rebel sharpshooter in the right knee-joint, was carried to White House where his wounds were dressed, and the 11th sent to King Street Hospital, Alexandria, where he died June 21, 1864, aged 20 years. (p761).

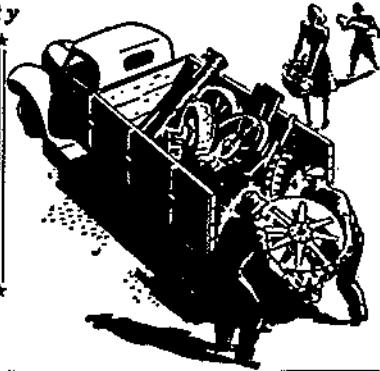

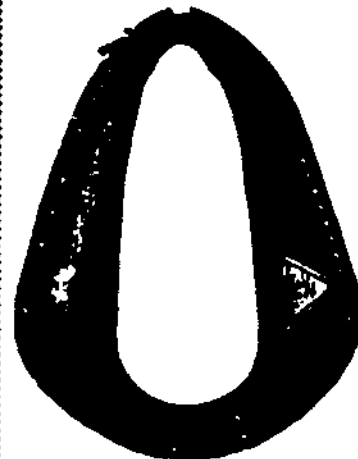
