ENGLISH RESEARCH REPORT

George F. Sanborn, Jr

When the Sanborn Family Association was established in 1983, it was decided that one of the primary objectives of the organization would be the continuation of research in England to try to identify the father of our Samborne immigrant ancestors, as well as to trace his ancestry as far back as possible. As an adjunct to this, any good clues to the maternal Bachiler lineage of the three Samborne immigrant boys would be followed up, as well. Some useful Bachiler information was found, and was published in the January, 1991, issue of *The New Hampshire Genealogical Record*, the quarterly journal of The New Hampshire Society of Genealogists, Inc. Among other things, the correct date and place of Rev. Stephen Bachiler's burial was shown.

A massive amount of English research was undertaken personally by the late Victor Channing Sanborn before his 1899 genealogy of the family was published. Moreover, he continued to carry out English research after that, resulting in the publication of a number of small pamphlets on his latest findings and theories. Regrettably, he was not able to identify the father of our immigrant ancestors. He did, however, come up with several excellent and carefully thought out theories, on which he and we have continued to work. V.C. Sanborn was of the opinion that our lineage would come, in some fashion, from Nicholas and Elizabeth (Brocas) Samborne of Mapledurham, Oxfordshire. Nicholas, the son of Walter and Margaret (Drew) Samborne of Southcote, Berkshire, was born about 1450 and died 28 April 1506, leaving a will. He seems to have had a daughter, Ann, who never married; a son John, who married Dorothy Tichborne and settled at Timsbury, Somersetshire; and a son Nicholas, known to have lived in the Andover, Hampshire, area, whose wife is unknown. The Timsbury branch of the family was prominent, and left numerous records of themselves, and could be ruled out as our ancestors. Nicholas the younger, on the other hand, lived near Wherwell and other Hampshire locations known to have been frequented by Rev. Stephen Bachiler, and so loomed as a real possibility. It is known that this last named Nicholas had three sons, at least: John, born about 1530, perhaps, and possibly still living as late as 1609, who was very obscure, and had the reversion of some real estate at Timsbury, but may not have lived there as no trace of him is there found; Rev. James, born circa 1540 and died in 1603, a gentleman and well-known clergyman, married to one Eleanor _____, he left a will and is clearly not our ancestor; and Edward, born perhaps about 1549, in Berkshire (as he said), living as late as 1603 in Hampshire. Either John or Edward could have been the father or, more likely, the grandfather of the father of our immigrant ancestors. Unfortunately, neither V.C. Sanborn nor we have been able to discover anything to show whom John and Edward married, or whether they had any

children. We are handicapped by the lack of early parish registers in the areas where they seem to have lived, as well as an absence of wills which would have thrown some light on their families. Consequently, we have been examining any scrap of paper that might throw some light on this problem.

A few years ago, we discovered a Richard Samborne of Herriard, Hampshire, born about 1579, who knew Rev. Stephen Bachiler. We thought we might be onto a "lost Samborne line" that would turn out to be ours. I cautioned against anyone jumping to the conclusion that this was the correct line, and that Richard was the father of the Samborne immigrants to New England, yet some people unfortunately picked this up and repeated it, even in print, despite the fact that Richard was about 21 years older than the mother of the immigrant boys! When we subsequently found that Richard was living as late as 30 May 1635, we knew that he was not the boys' father, as their mother, Ann, was a widow in 1630, and remarried in England in 1632. It was later shown that the Richard Samborne of Herriard was the same man as Richard Samborne who was baptised in Timsbury, Somersetshire, on 21 September 1579, of the Timsbury branch of the family, and, as such, could be ruled out from further consideration.

We were then left once again to ponder John and Edward, sons of Nicholas Samborne of Andover. Nothing more was found about them or any families they might have had. Ann (Bachiler) Samborne, mother of the Samborne immigrants, was aged about 30 in 1630, obviously making her born about 1600. If her husband was her age or a little older, he was born, shall we say, 1595 - 1600. Older secondary sources published in this country claiming that his name was John or William are based on nothing and are completely unreliable, and should be ignored by researchers. The fact is, we do not know the name of the father of the Samborne immigrants.

Last winter, we decided to shift gears and look at the problem from another angle. Based on a clue sent by a friend who does not descend from the Samborne-Sanborn family, we started looking closely at the family of Thomas Samborne of Sonning, Berkshire, born circa 1505 and died in 1584. He was the grandson of Drew Samborne, of Reading, Berkshire, a brother of Nicholas Samborne of Mapledurham, Oxfordshire. Thomas Samborne was married five times, his last wife, Clemence (Harbord) (Stampe) Samborne, dying in 1618 leaving a lengthy will naming a grandson John Samborne of Wallingford, Berkshire, who was to be an executor of her estate. Unfortunately, this grandson, John, who was born about 1591, died just a month after the widow Clemence died, and he was buried at Wallingford St Peter on 18 October 1618. This John was a grandson of Thomas Samborne through his son Richard Samborne, born circa 1557, who had married Elizabeth Stampe, a daughter of widow Clemence by her first husband, Richard Stampe, so young John was a grandson of both Thomas and Clemence from their earlier marriages to other people. The

thought occurred to us that this John might have been the father of the immigrant boys: he was born at the right time, had a believable name, and died young. Perhaps, however, he died a little too young! If he was married to Ann Bachiler, who we believe was born about 1600, then she was only 18 at that time, a tad young to have had three sons, even if one of them was born posthumously. Perhaps she was actually born a bit earlier than 1600, but if so, we must be prepared to not believe her deposition in 1630 when she said she was then 30 years old. Also, if her husband had died in 1618, why would the lovely young widow have waited until 1632 to remarry? Another problem is the ages of the three boys. While we do not know exactly when any of them was born, John left two depositions, taken many years apart, in which his birth year can be shown to have been about 1620. He is thought to have been the oldest of the three boys (earlier suggestions that he was not, notwithstanding). For the John Samborne buried at Wallingford St Peter, Berkshire, on 18 October 1618 to have been the husband of Ann Bachiler and father of the three immigrant boys, we would have to say that John was the youngest of the three and that he was actually born posthumously in 1619. Possible, but still a stretch, in view of the widow Ann's stated age of 30 in 1630. This theory might "work", but we have to convince ourselves that Ann was born earlier than 1600; that brothers Stephen and William Samborne were older than John; and that John was born probably in 1619 and not in 1620. This last is not hard to accept, since the depositions did not give a year of birth but rather an age for John which, depending on when in the year he was born could easily account for the one year difference in the stated age. Then there is also the problem of why the widow Ann, with three sons, would have gone from 1618 to 1632 before remarrying.

This is where we are at the present time, not having entirely discarded John and Edward, sons of Nicholas Samborne of Andover, Hampshire, but still warily looking at young John Samborne who was buried at Wallingford St Peter on 18 October 1618. John seems not to have left a will or anything to throw light on any family he might have had; we are feverishly trying to find a will or further documentation concerning his father, Richard Samborne who seems to have resided at South Stoke near Wokingham, Berkshire (and who is NOT the Richard Samborne of Herriard, Hampshire, mentioned earlier). If only Richard of South Stoke, who probably outlived his son, John, had left a will naming his grandchildren (if any), we would be in a much stronger position to either rule this family in, or rule them out. We continue to try to find more about them.

Funding for the English research comes from donations for that purpose and, when those funds have been exhausted, from the general funds of the Sanborn Family Association are used because this activity is one of the stated purposes of the existence of the organization. MAINE CEMETERY SAFARI

I use the term "safari" because I crawled through impenetrable brush, bushes, and forests looking for headstones of my early ancestors and I met up with one of the most unforgiving, dangerous critters--the dreadful black fly! The fact that, according to newspaper accounts, so small an insect can chase a moose out onto the highway. This resulted in three people killed when they hit a moose during my two week stay. Proof enough of their ferocity.

My interest in the Sanborn line began when I learned that my great-grandmother was Sarah (Salley) Sanborn, the daughter of William Sanborn (VCS #327) that married Josiah Perry. She was also my fifth cousin, four times removed, because Salley's fifth cousin, twice removed, Eliza A. Sanborn, married Josiah's son, Jaman Perry, my grandfather. Further investigation may prove I'm my own grandfather!

William Sanborn (VCS #327) had two wives. The second wife's name has been unknown, although she had four children including my great-grandmother Sarah.

Sarah was not buried with her husband Josiah, and after seeing his picture, I think I know why: She was buried in the Larrabee plot with her daughter Vienna (Perry) Larrabee.

Two of the 288 cemetery photographs I took presented a mystery that VCS and Elmer's book didn't seem to solve.

In the Baptist Church Cemetery in Limerick, ME, this headstone reads:

**Anne Carroll Moore Daughter of
Luther Sanborn & Sarah Hidden Moore
Born in Limerick, Maine July 12, 1871
Died in New York, New York January 20, 1961**



There appears to be no record of Luther Sanborn's marriage to Sarah Hidden Moore. However, in Robert L. Taylor's book, "Early Families of Limerick, Maine", pg. 28, there's Sarah Hidden (Barker) Moore marrying Luther S. Moore, Esq. That Luther S. was from Parsonsfield, a neighboring town. It seems odd that the daughter carries the mother's surname and not the father's?

Again, VCS, Robert L. Taylor, and both the Limerick and Parsonsfield vital records, provide no clues.

This monument in the Monroe, ME, cemetery, honors the soldiers of various wars. Each side addresses each war. In between cloudbursts and the incessant attack by black flies, I was able to take some pictures.

Although the statue was primarily for the soldiers in the Civil War, one side was dedicated to the War of 1812. On the bottom of the third row, John Sanborn is listed.

There are 332 John Sanborns in the All Names Index of V.S. Sanborns book. Perhaps someone knows which one this is? My guess, since the statue is in ME, that it's one of the two John Sanborns from Parsonsfield.

The Civil War battle of the Wilderness was fought May 5 through the 7th in Northern Virginia, known as the Overland Campaign.

Edwin O. Sanborn is listed in Company K, 26th Regiment.

For those who have not recently visited the New England states, the ice storms of January 1998 caused terrible damage to homes, businesses, and the last to be repaired, the cemeteries. I found many headstones toppled and broken by tree limbs.

The 1999 Maine Cemetery Safari is in the planning stage. It will include a bee keepers suit, complete with a netted pith helmet--and perhaps a flame thrower.

SANBORN SAMPLER

Roger M. Pike has recently discovered a unique source for Sanborn history - a sampler made by his Sanborn ancestor, **Elizabeth Sanborn** (VCS #780-vi), in 1824. Roger reports that "The sampler is currently located in Rutland, VT, in my possession, as my wife and I explore alternatives as to how to best conserve it. It has probably lain folded in a trunk since 1932/33 when my father closed out the estate of his grandmother, Helen Dow Pike Stone, in New Hampshire. I suspect it has been folded and in a trunk much longer than that. The sampler is in very good condition except for the fading of one particular color of original thread."

The sampler is signed: "Elizabeth Sanborn in her 12th year, Jan 30, 1824". The sampler then goes on to list the following births, using an abbreviated version of "Sanborn"

If we compare the sampler with V C Sanborn, we can clearly see that the sampler matches the names but adds and corrects data given in VCS. The parents of this family were Nehemiah Sanborn (VCS #780) and his wife Lydia Lovering. According to VCS, their children were:

 Polly Jenness, mar Horatio G Brown of Hampton Falls
 Alfred, b & d 1809

 Woodbridge, b 1815, d 1829
 Clarissa Ann, b 8 Nov 1818
 Martha Webster, b 18 Jan 1820

Since Elizabeth's parents were both living when she made the sampler, we can pretty safely assume that the dates she gives are accurate. Thus, Sally could not have been baptised in 1797 and Clarissa was born in 1817, not 1818. Regarding Polly's middle initial in the sampler, the J at that time was often written as I.

PERSONAL PROFILE — Frances Robinson Mitchell

Born in Bangor, Maine, in 1924, the only child of Lawrence Lamont Robinson (Sanborn line) and Geneva (Steen) Robinson. I grew up in northern Penobscot County at Stacyville Plantation where my family was engaged in the lumber business. I enjoyed riding on the Lombard steam loghauler in the 1930s. Received secondary education at Ricker Classical Institute in Houlton, Maine. Attended the University of Maine two years, then in 1944 enlisted in the US Marine Corps Women's Reserve and from boot camp I went to Motor Transport School at Camp Lejeune, NC. It was an interesting experience to say the least — alligators and all. In fact, I wrote of all this in the book, *Experiencing the Great Depression and World War II: A Look Back to an Unforgettable Period* (published by Bear's Paw Press in 1989, ISBN is 0-9625408-1-1).

After the war, two years in a row to earn money for an American Legion hall for our post, I put on vaudeville shows using local talent and period clothes (borrowed from attics in four towns around the territory). For scenery the first year, beginning on the left side we drew a fairly steep hill half covered with daisies and buttercups, etc., sloping down to a valley with mountains in the distance at center stage; to the right we showed a street with shops and houses winding off in the distance. Very talented people, beautifully costumed, did numbers such as: "Bicycle Built for Two", "What You Gonna Do When the Rent Comes Round", "Beautiful Ohio", "Mary's a Grand Old Name", along with tap dance and instrumental numbers. However, an elderly French lady, who could speak only a little English, stole the show after she went on stage wearing a black, period dress with laced ankle-high shoes, and sat down in a straight chair with her accordion to entertain with French folk music and trotting her feet all the while — it was lively and delightful, to say the least.

The second year the scenery was even more beautiful for we used phosphorescent paint in a soft gold color to give a warm glow to street lamps and the windows in a large "brick" building beyond the sidewalk across the street (left stage) and down the street narrowing in the distance (center stage); the stars and moon over the park (right stage) shown brightly with silver phosphorescent paint. There were flower beds and benches every so often along a path in the park. But, also, on right stage was a flower bed with crepe paper flowers and a park bench made of white slats on the curved seat and back - a beauty! The setting was delightful when the lights were dimmed for such numbers as "Three O'clock in the Morning" (danced and sung), "Moonlight and Roses", "Venetian Moon", "Only a Rose", etc. A tenor sang "A Pretty Girl is Like a Melody", and "Lonah", while a soprano did "Sometimes I Feel Like a Motherless Child". Daylight numbers included "While Strolling Through the Park One Day", and on the bench, "Ma, She's Making Eyes at Me" — the man doing that number was a meat cutter in a grocery store and had never considered being on stage before, but he and a local school teacher stole the show. One of the local clergy (a priest) did "Napoleon's Last Charge" and "Tavern in the Town" on the piano. Wouldn't it be fun to see shows of this nature today! I feel very fortunate to have lived in northern Penobscot County in the 1930s and after, and to have known "The Merry Men of Maine", an experience that can never be duplicated. PERSONAL PROFILE — Emma Jane Heyne Carter

This is a follow up to the "Season's Greetings" item on page 9 of the Spring 1998 *Sanborn Signatures*. Emma Carter sent me (the editor) further information on her family and I have written the following from the data she sent me.



Emma Carter's Sanborn grandmother was Emma Cornelia Sanborn who married Henry Seapolt Heyne. Their son was Jeremiah Simpson Heyne who married Laura May Beegle. Their daughter was Emma Jane Heyne, the subject of this profile.

Emma Jane Heyne Carter is a retired clerk and a self-described "Retired Domestic Engineer". She spent 13 years as an Emergency Room clerk; 1.5 years as a clerk typist for the Alaskan Dept of Highways, running their mail room. She also worked various 6 month intervals in other places, such as the laboratory in several different canneries in Salem OR, testing foods for the cannery & FDA.

She married Robert "Dale" Carter, a farmer, on 6 July 1950. He was going into business with his father, "Carter & Sons", raising crops for the Willamette Valley Canneries. He came down with polio on 27 August 1950. For the next 7 years he ran a business called "Dale Bike Shop" in Lebanon OR. He closed the business and went to school in Klamath Falls OR in 1957. He attended what is now Oregon Institute of Technology (at the time it was called OTI, Oregon Technical Institute). He graduated and went to work in 1959 for Oregon state Dept of Transportation as an Engineering Technician in Bridge Design. His engineering took us to Alaska where he worked for the Alaska Dept of Transportation and then back to the State of Oregon Bridge Design Dept. He had to have 6 years in the particular field he wished to work in to apply for the EIT (Engineer in Training Exam). He took that test in 1966, passed it, and the next year applied for and received his professional engineering degree in Civil Engineering. So Emma married a farmer and ended up with an engineer.

Emma and Dale have three children. Michael Dale Carter works for Hewlett-Packard, Corvallis OR, and has two sons, Chris & Seth, with his wife Kathy (a LPN). Chris and his wife Chaundra have a daughter, Cheylee, born in February 1998. Seth is at the University of Oregon's School of Music and in their Drama Dept.

Emma and Dale's second child is Keevin Roy Carter, a Firefighter, Engineer, for the city of Eugene, working for them 23 years. His wife Sharon is a Registered Nurse and works in Eugene's big, new Willamette Valley Cancer Center. She is Keevin's second marriage and between them they have 8 children, ages 10 to 28.

Emma and Dale's third child is Loreen Marie Carter Schulzetenberg an RN. She has been a labor & delivery room nurse for 15 years, married twice, and has three sons. Roscoe reported he is looking for profiles on family members to print in *Sanborn Signatures*. Anyone who would like to write up a profile of 300-400 words please send them to Charlie Watson. He will try to print a few each edition. Sandy Partridge reported



on our tax exempt status. We are a not-for-profit organization but we need to show good will and deeds to become tax exempt. The scholarship program and genealogy research are the two areas of deeds for tax exempt status. It was suggested that we aim our scholarship at a student working in a genealogy program at a university or college. It was also asked what comes first, the scholarship or the plan. Sandy stated that with \$4000.00 we could not offer much money for scholarships. Ruth Casalles reported on her experience with non-profit organizations. Leslie Lassiter reported that she deals with the IRS all the time in her line of work and will be willing to help us. Leslie Lassiter, Ruth Casalles and Sandy Partridge will get together and work on this.

Marion Sanborn announced she would like to put together a cookbook to raise money for the scholarship fund. She would like original Sanborn recipes. Marion would like everyone to send their favorite recipes to her at 143 Currier Road, Andover NH 03216.

Roscoe stated he would like to set up a web page for the Sanborn Family Association. A motion was made by Bob Baxter and seconded by Mary Jane Lewis to set up a web page; motion was approved. Mary Jane stated she would like to have a professional set up the page for us. Roscoe said he has a grandson with a lot of experience in this field who will be willing to help us.

The roll call of states showed people present from Nevada, California, New Mexico, Michigan, Louisiana, Florida, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Vermont, Maine, and New Hampshire, with the largest number, 21, from Massachusetts. Forty-eight descendants of John Sanborn were present, 14 from William, and none from Stephen.

The people traveling the farthest to get to the reunion were Mr and Mrs Richard (Dick) Sanborn of Nevada. Winifred Wayman was the oldest member attending at age 92. The youngest member attending was 9 year old Cynthia Kaselis of Lowell MA.

The business meeting was adjourned and a delicious buffet dinner was served. After lunch the scotch auction was held led by Richard Norcross and crew. The raffle of the V C Sanborn book was won by Lois Sanborn Appel of Romeo MI. As Lois also won the raffle last year she was kind enough to donate the book back to the Association for next year's raffle.

• In the Spring 1998 issue of *Sanborn Signatures* the New Findings column listed a number of Sanborns noted in *History of Stanstead County, PQ*, by B.F. Hubbard. Some of them relate to my Sanborn line — **Samuel SANBORN**, whose son Nathaniel married into the Heath and Mosher lines who were original founders of Barnston. Samuel was born 28 July 1745. His parentage and place of birth have not yet been found. He died 30 Nov 1838 at Barnston, Stanstead Co, PQ. The dates are from his cemetery stone located at the Heathton Cemetery near Barnston. His wife was Mary _____, born 4 Feb 1749 and died 26 Oct 1821. Their children claimed to have been born at Sanbornton NH. How does this line tie into the Sanborn Genealogy? Samuel and Mary had two sons: 1) Levi, b 16 Mar 1780 at Sanbornton NH; mar Lucy Plumley; died June 1842 at Barnston and buried at Heathton Cemetery. In the 1825 census there was 1 dau and 1 son, both under 6 years of age. 2) Nathaniel, b 18 Mar 1782 at Sanbornton NH; mar 1st 2 June 1809 to Susanna Libby (b 17 July 1792, d 12 Dec 1810); mar 2nd Elizabeth (Heath) Colby; All 12 children were born at Barnston. The family moved to Burnett Twp, Dodge Co WI in 1844. Nathaniel and Elizabeth are buried at the Oakwood Cemetery at Beaver Dam WI. Their children spread across Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Iowa. How does this family tie into the rest of the Sanborn Genealogy? I will gladly share information on all descendants of Samuel Sanborn.

• Where do I connect to the Sanborn's? The scant information that I have is as follows. **Wellington Samuel SANBORN** was born in St Albans ME, June 24, 1859. From a newspaper article, he came to Michigan in 1875 (he was 16). He had two brothers, John and Edward, and two sisters, Mary and Etta (called Eda). No record as to birth order except in his obituary where he was 83. The men came to log in Michigan. When Wellington was 25 he married Elizabeth Sikes McClure. Their children were Wellington Andrew (my father), Ivy Sanborn Lorentzer, Homer Douglas, Abby (died as toddler), Esther, and James. Wellington Samuel Sanborn left Michigan in 1912 and went to California where he died at Rackerly on January 7, 1943. Following the 1998 SFA Reunion, my husband and I took the advice of fellow SFA members and went to the Maine Archives in Augusta ME where we were unable to find any of my family in the limited time that I had. If at first you don't succeed, etc., etc., etc. I am still trying. If anyone can help me I would greatly appreciate it.

• **Looking for Ancestors of Homer Vinton SANBORN** and how he fits into the Sanborn Genealogy. Homer was born in Bridgeport NY on 13 Nov 1853 and died 10 Feb 1901. Homer's 1st wife was Julia Haynes (b 16 Feb 1849, d 14 Feb 1886); their children were Helen (b 24 Oct 1882, d 1 June 1930) and Westall (b 14 Feb 1886, d 25 July 1886). His 2nd wife was Olive Welton (mar 18 Sep 1886); their children were Lyon (b 15 Sep 1887?, d 10 Oct 1960) and Horace Greeley (b 9 Feb 1891, d 21 May 1970). Horace Greeley Sanborn is my grandfather. Homer Vinton Sanborn had brothers Rozelle A (eventually in Colorado), Lewis, and Earl A. Sanborn. Homer's father was either a Westall or Wiloughby Sanborn or Sandborn. It is likely that Homer's parents were the Wiloughby Sandborn (age 22, of Cicero NY) and Charlotte Ellis (age 21, of Boonville NY) who were married in Bridgeport NY on 6 March 1849. Theophilus CASS (per *Signatures*, Spring 1998, p 16) was daughter of **Eliphalet SANBORN** (VCS #120) and Margaret (Wallis/Wallace) of Epsom NH. They were one of the 9 partners in the Cassville settlement of Stanstead, PQ, CAN. She died there 1872, and he died 1861 age 84. Some confusion if Theophilus is a Jr., or s/o Simon or John. They had one child, Sally CASS 27 Jan 1805 - 25 Mar 1885 who m 1829 **James Munroe LOCK**. Her brother **William SANBORN** married **Elizabeth CASS**, and her mother, **Margaret (WALLIS)** was the daughter of **George WALLIS, Sr.**, Deacon, and **Margaret (McClary)**. — *Notes from Nick Sanborn; also The History of Stanstead Co.; B. • **SANBORN, Jeremiah, Lt.**, (VCS #749)s/o John and his 3rd wife **Anna (SANBORN)** who d 1802, was born 6 Jul 1790 at Bride Hill in Hampton NH, died 22 Sep 1830 Bride Hill. He married **Lydia REDMAN** and had 3 children: **Joseph Redman**, 1817-1897, lived on homestead, **Sarah Ann** 1819-, and **Lydia Frances** 1823-, both probably unmarried and lived on homestead.

Jesse, (VCS #751) born at Bride Hill, 27 Aug 1771, s/o John and Lydia (Rollins), lived in old mansion house at Bride Hill just on Hampton and Exeter boundary line. Had daughters **Sarah Stevens** of Stratham who died 8 Dec 1800, and **Betsey Lovering**, b 1801 of North Hampton. — *Bride Hill Cemetery (1780) Records.*
