THE VIOLENT DEATH OF CALEB SANBORN

In 1851, under pressure from the United States government, the Sioux Indians signed treaties surrendering rights to vast areas of land west of the Mississippi River. Southern Minnesota comprised a major portion of this land.

At mid-day on 17 August 1862, a band of four angry Sioux Indians murdered five white settlers living near Acton in Meeker Co MN. Within a few hours the terrible Sioux Uprising had begun in the midst of the Civil War. Before the Sioux agreed to end the fighting, several hundred white settlers would be killed (1).

One month after the Acton slayings, a farmer who resided in another part of Meeker Co was killed by the Indians in a most brutal fashion. His name was Caleb Sanborn. Accounts vary, but most of them mention gunshot wounds in the bowels. One report described a large, gaping knife-wound between his shoulders. Most horrifying, however, was the fact that Sanborn's own grubbing hoe was used to hack his face to a point beyond recognition. And while one account said he was scalped, another said he was not scalped because the Indians feared the power of his red hair. The men of the search party who found him agreed Sanborn had put up a vigorous fight for his life. He has been described as a rugged, fearless man and evidently earned that reputation.

Who was this Caleb Sanborn? In September 1999 I was asked by Mrs Lorraine Pedersen of Hutchinson MN to find out if Caleb was possibly a relative of her neighbor and good friend, Mrs Fanny (Perkins) Pankake, who descends from Daniel Sanborn (VCS #866) of Orange NH. Mrs. Pankake's roots go back to the days when Minnesota was a Territory.

Identifying Caleb required an examination of the 1860 Federal Census to determine his age, birthplace, and marital status. Caleb's age was given as 39 years old in 1860, living alone on his farm. He was a native of NH and owned real estate worth \$1,000. I reasoned that he was likely the son of Abraham Sanborn (VCS #357) of Springfield, Sullivan Co NH. Scant information regarding Abraham's family was provided by VCS. His entry for Caleb stated that he was born 9 October 1820 and 'probably died unmarried'. Only a sister was described as having moved west. I needed more data to tie the Meeker Co Caleb to Abraham of Springfield NH.

While I was digging for answers, Lorraine Pedersen was also searching in MN. She obtained histories for both Meeker Co and the adjoining McLeod Co. Reports describing the same Indian raid varied from one county to the other. It was apparent that early inaccuracies were copied by later historians.

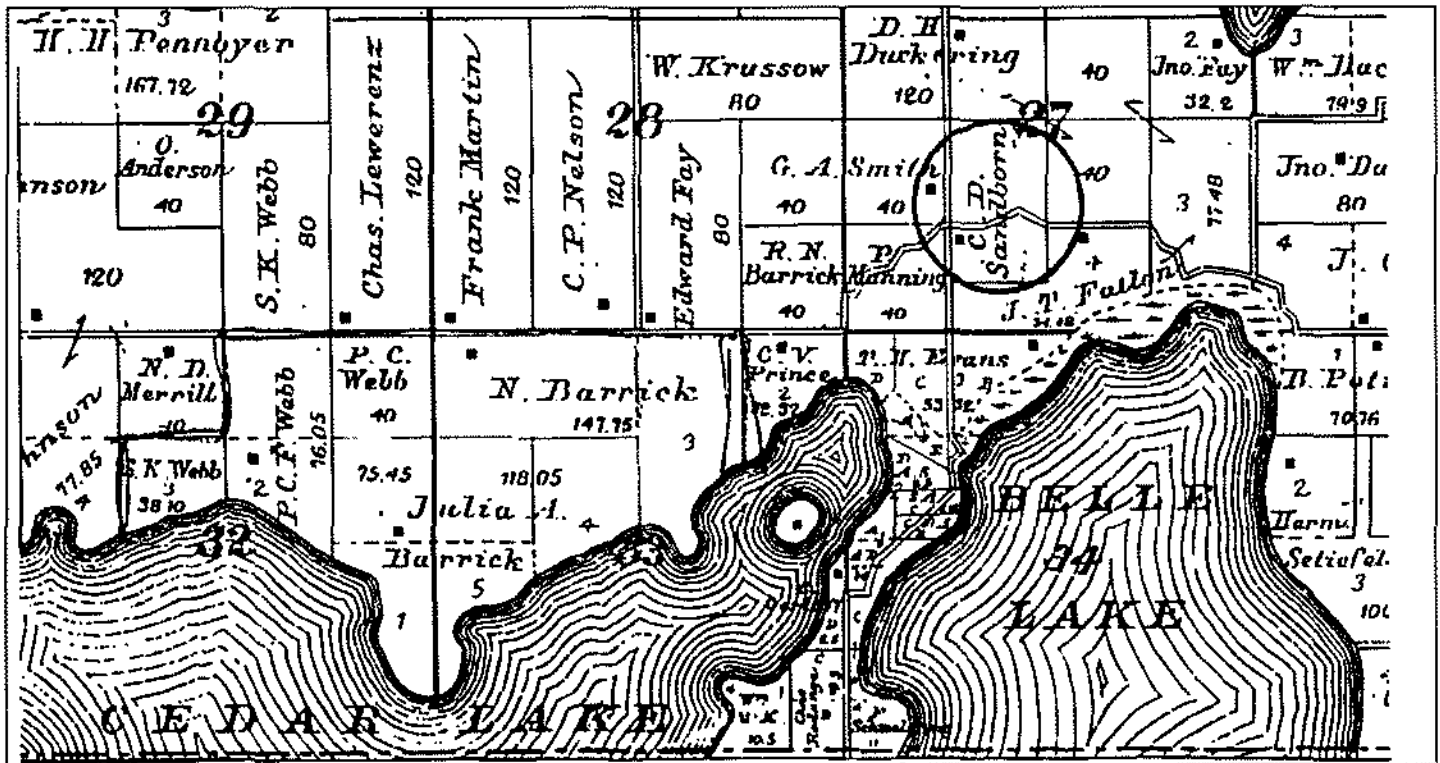

Such was the situation when one report gave the name of the Sanborn who was murdered in Meeker Co as "Hiram". The rest of the description of the attack was the same as for Caleb's. As a matter of fact, Caleb Sanborn of Springfield NH had a brother named Hiram. And, whereas Caleb Sanborn of Meeker Co was listed in the reference, Known Military and Civilian Dead During the Minnesota Sioux Indian Massacre in 1862, Hiram was not. It could be that the reporting error was made in the excitement of the moment by someone who had known both Sanborn brothers.

Sanborn Memorial

Along a rural road in south Meeker Co, near the shore of Belle Lake, stands an upright granite marker which is dedicated to Caleb Sanborn. The marker is located 400 feet from where Sanborn was fatally attacked 19 September 1862, not far from his farm (2). Most accounts state that Sanborn was at work on his claim in Greenleaf Township when he was set upon by roving Indian marauders on the warpath. For two weeks he and his family had been in the Hutchinson fort where several hundred settlers had taken refuge (3). Feeling restless, he decided to go back to his place to get some work done. When his friends voiced their concerns, Sanborn assured them that he would be fine. Sanborn was a friend of the peaceful local Indians and had no fear of them.

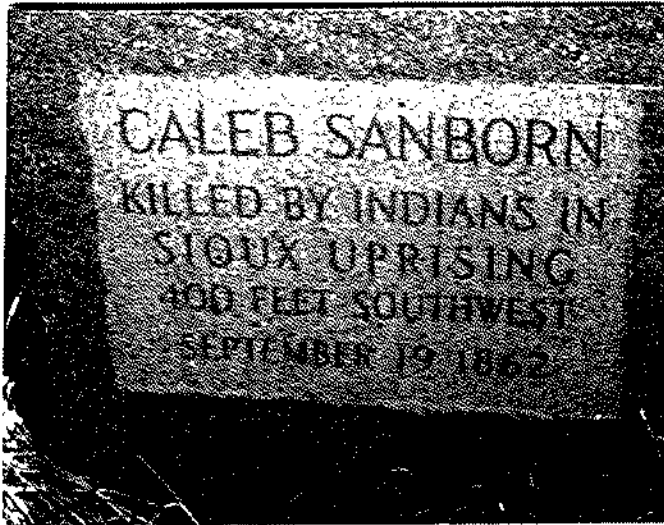
A search party went to look for Sanborn when no word was heard from him (4). Some of the men stayed with the wagon

while others went on foot toward Sanborn's house. As the searchers rounded a corner of brush, they were met by a volley of shots from the woods. Daniel Cross was instantly killed. The others, except for T R Webb, fled to their wagon and escaped. Webb ran to the lake, took his boat, and hid on the open lake. The next day about 20 men came out to look for Cross and Sanborn and were shocked by the mutilation, which they saw. The bodies were taken to Hutchinson, approximately 12 miles to the south in McLeod Co.

Waiting at the fort in Hutchinson was Caleb Sanborn's pregnant wife, Lydia, and two year old son, Caleb D. One can only imagine the terrible fear and anxiety experienced by Lydia and her son as they waited for the return of the search party. A few days after Lydia learned her husband was dead, she gave birth at the fort to a son and named him Abraham. (Might this be another tie to Abraham Sanborn of Springfield, NH?)

Who is Lydia?

The existence of a wife and child came as a surprise to this researcher. Neither is named in the 1860 census as living with Sanborn on his farm. The son, Caleb D, would have been a newborn at the time of the June 1860 census. Perhaps the baby and his mother were staying elsewhere in the township after his birth. A Lydia Sanborn, however, is not named in the 1860 census index for Minnesota. Then I learned why.

In a last-ditch effort to identify Lydia, the LDS Vital Records were checked, and I found the answers to most of my questions. The record stated the following: Caleb Sanborn, son of Abraham of Springfield, married 17 September 1860 in NH to Lydia F Hoyt, daughter of Richard Heath. Lydia was further identified as having been married previously. Caleb, who had first come to Meeker Co MN in the year 1857, evidently made a trip or two back to NH in order for him to have fathered a child and then marry Lydia there in September of 1860.

On 1 August 1863 Lydia Sanborn made application to the Honorable Albert S White, Cyrus Aldridge, and Eli R Chase, of the Sioux Depredation Commission, requesting reimbursement for her property losses (5). A detailed list of ruined or stolen household furnishings, weapons, farm tools, winter coats, and crops was submitted, totaling more than \$500. Also attached to the request were detailed reports of the incidents prior to Sanborn's murder. Included in the claim were Lydia's recollections of the 23rd of August when she, her husband, and two year old son were forced to flee their home and take shelter on an island in Cedar Lake, remaining there for twelve days before returning home and then taking refuge at the fort in Hutchinson. [See the map; Cedar Lake has an island on it; the likely hideout for the Sanborns.] There were testimonies in Lydia's behalf from Acton Hunter, Joseph Lemaitre, and Thaddeus R Webb. In October 1863, Lydia was granted \$150 compensation by the inadequately funded Depredation Commission.

The MN State Census of 1865 shows Lydia married to Elkanah McStotts, who was a native of Scotland. There were four McStotts children listed and Lydia's sons, Caleb D and Abraham Sanborn. This census was primarily a head count. There was no other information such as age and birthplace.

By 1870 Lydia may have died. Her name does not appear in the census as living in the McStotts' household in New

Virginia Twp. Four year old Andrew, likely the son of Lydia, is named--the only McStotts child born in MN. Another surprise appears in the form of a Lydia Sanborn, age 67, who lives in the house next to the McStotts farm and cares for Caleb D, 10, born NH and Abraham, 7, born MN. This Lydia, who was probably called to help in a time of need, may have been a cousin of Caleb's. He did have a cousin Lydia who was born in 1803 in Springfield NH, the daughter of Joseph Sanborn (VCS #355-iv). She would have been 67 in 1870, the same age as the Lydia Sanborn in the census.

The original farm which Caleb Sanborn owned stayed in the family and was still on the county plat map in 1907. Caleb D Sanborn, his son, was the owner. If there are any descendants of Sanborn's two sons who read this article, I would be most happy to hear from them.

It is now clear that Caleb Sanborn, son of Abraham, descended from immigrant John Sanborn, whereas Mrs. Pankake descends from John's brother, William Sanborn. Not exactly close cousins. I'm glad that Lorraine Pedersen and I were able to learn the true story, and what a tale it is!

5. These Sioux Depredation Case Files were documents filed with the Sioux Commission in 1863 by those suffering property loss as a result of the Dakota Conflict. In addition to listing property losses, the documents include statements from friends and neighbors confirming the claimant's testimony and descriptions of the Indian attacks



Some of the causes of the Sioux Uprising: The Indians were never happy with the 1851 treaties and as time went by their discontent turned to rage. Not only had they lost their valuable hunting grounds, they were forced to live on reservations, which were much too small, and had to contend with mostly inept US agents who were often unfair and uncaring. Making matters worse were the white traders who gave the Indians liquor in exchange for the Indians' annuity money. Their 1861 corn crop had been very poor and the Indians were in danger of starving, yet the agents refused to give food and goods to Indians who had no annuity money. Many Indians were so desperate that they thought they should take advantage of the opportunity to get their lands back while the white men were occupied by their own Civil War.

MORE ON JEREMIAH W SANBORN

[Editor's note: In mid-February, new SFA member Paul Sanborn sent an email with additional information about the career of Jeremiah W Sanborn who was the subject of the featured article in the Fall 1999 "Sanborn Signatures". With his permission I am printing his email here.]

I've just finished reading the fascinating story in *Sanborn Signatures* about Jeremiah Sanborn and his role at Utah State University. Coincidentally, just last week, I'd been re-reading some material about the previous phase of his career as the 2nd Dean of the College of Agriculture at the Univ of Missouri (1882-89).

His major claim to fame there was through his establishment of some long-term research plots (1888) which later became known as "Sanborn Field". These plots were established to provide a better understanding of the effects of practices such as crop rotation on the long-term productivity and fertility of Missouri soils, and are apparently still maintained using similar management regimes. This provides a unique set of conditions for modern researchers and, in fact, it was through a 1988 article in the *Soil Science Society of America Journal* that I first learned of the existence of Sanborn Field. Correspondence with the author and other staff at the Univ of Missouri provided some useful background on this installation and its founder.

Research Bulletin 1054 of the Univ of MO Agricultural Experiment Station, "Sanborn Field: Historical Perspective" (1985) provides a tantalizing glimpse into the atmosphere during Sanborn's tenure:

"Sanborn ... was a native of New Hampshire and a graduate of the New Hampshire College of Agriculture. He arrived in Missouri

in the face of controversy that had flared over the location of the College. In him, the Board of Curators found a man of intellectual prowess as well as one with practical experience. A man ideally trained to represent the agricultural interests of the College and state, Sanborn was both a teacher and scientific investigator. He seemed to be the calming, unifying effect the school needed. But too much was expected of Sanborn, and his administration was marked by storms, bitterness and turmoil. After seven years, in 1889, Sanborn received an ultimatum from the Board of Curators: resign or be dismissed. He resigned."

Apart from the shared name, I've been struck by some obvious parallels in my own career interests, though fortunately not in the circumstances under which I've changed jobs! My PhD is in soil science (UBC, 1987), and for the past 8 years, I've worked in the research program of the British Columbia Ministry of Forests. During that time, my largest research commitment has been as a collaborator in a long-term study of the effects of forestry practices on soil properties and subsequent tree growth. This work is very much in the same spirit that led JWS to establish the installation that bears his name, and I'm pleased to be carrying on this tradition.

Since I'm a new member of the SFA, I'm not sure if your readers have already heard about two other examples of Sanborn involvement in the natural sciences. There is a (non-precious) mineral called Sanbornite, first discovered in the early 1900's in California, and named after a geologist who had worked in the state's Bureau of Mines. In zoology, there is a species known as Sanborn's Long-Nosed Bat, native to the Southwest US, and named by or after a Sanborn who had done research on the mammals of that region. (When I heard about this one more than 10 years ago, the name created considerable amusement for my family and relatives in southern Ontario – a prominent proboscis is certainly one of the distinguishing traits of our branch of the tribe, at least 1 or 2 generations back.)

SANBORN FOUNDATION

[Editor's note: A few weeks ago Roscoe Sanborn, recent SFA President, referred me to the website of the Sanborn Foundation. I contacted the Foundation and received a brochure and permission to quote from the brochure and the website (<http://www.town.arlington.ma.us/sanborn.htm>). Although the Foundation's work relates only to Arlington MA residents, I thought the entire SFA would be interested in what one Sanborn family has done. What follows is directly quoted from the two sources with minor editorial changes.]

Statement of Purpose

The Elizabeth and George L. Sanborn Foundation for the Treatment and Cure of Cancer, Inc. (the Sanborn Foundation) was established in 1998 to provide financial support for the treatment and cure of cancer. Grant money has been provided



by the will of the late Arlington resident, George L. Sanborn, in memory of his wife Elizabeth and himself. Elizabeth Sanborn died of cancer in Arlington in 1931.

Sanborn Foundation Grants are intended to benefit Arlington residents who have cancer. Sanborn Foundation funds may be used to: 1) support service, educational and other projects undertaken by practitioners or institutions to improve cancer care; 2) help Arlington residents with cancer meet immediate short-term needs related to the disease and its treatment; and 3) fund research on the prevention, treatment and cure of cancer.

Examples of Projects

Board members are interested in a variety of initiatives focused on the prevention, treatment, or cure of cancer. Examples of projects supported by or of interest to the Sanborn Foundation include but are not limited to: 1) Services, educational programs, and other projects for Arlington residents: a) cancer screening program; b) smoking cessation program; c) cancer-focused education for Arlington primary care providers. 2) Services to meet individual and immediate short-term needs that reduce stress or improve the quality of life for Arlington residents dealing with cancer: a) subsidize transportation to and from cancer treatments; b) provide chairlift for a person with cancer unable to climb stairs. 3) Research projects such as: a) study of a patient education program to reduce chemotherapy side effects; b) study of an intervention to reduce the risk of developing cancer for Arlington residents.

Organization

The activities of the Foundation are directed by a Board of Directors. Board members must be residents of the town of Arlington or individuals with ties to Arlington.

The Board must include members that have a family member with cancer, or that have expertise in cancer research, oncology, finance, public health, health education, nursing care, health policy, hospice care, or related field. Board members are volunteers.

Grant Application Process

Sanborn Foundation Grant Application Forms may be requested either by mail or by telephone from: The Elizabeth and George L. Sanborn Foundation for the Treatment and Cure of Cancer, Inc., PO Box 417, Arlington, MA 02474, 781-643-7775.

Applications will be judged on the basis of the following criteria: 1) the goals of the request match the general goals of Sanborn Foundation; 2) the financial need cannot be met by other organizations or foundations or is not covered by insurers; and 3) the extent to which the project or request benefits the town of Arlington or its residents.

KENDALL SANBORN – WHAT HAPPENED TO HIM?

[Editor's note: Marsha Wilgis sent me a query with quite a lot of information about Kendall's family. As a result I am placing the information here rather than in the usual 'Query' section. Kendall is Marsha's great grandfather. If anyone knows what happened to him, please write Marsha. He is in V C Sanborn as # 644 viii, listed with 5 brothers, two of whom, at least, had moved to CA.]

Kendall Sanborn was my great grandfather. I have a picture of him and know all the generations in America before him, but I do not know where he died or was buried. My grandmother was an only child, as far as we know.

Kendall's father was Capt John Ware Sanborn [VCS # 644]; his mother was Mary Jane Locke, a descendant of Capt John Locke of Locke's Neck NH where a statue was erected in his memory.

Kendall's wife was Mary Evelyn Laird (her mother's maiden name was Milliard), born 24 Jan 1858 in Saratoga, Santa Clara County, CA, died 9 May 1940 in Saratoga. She & Kendall were married 1 Mar 1877 in Saratoga and divorced 20 Dec 1881. I can find no wedding certificate nor divorce papers; I only have hand written notes by my mother of what my grandmother told her. Kendall was a robust man, I was told, tall, with a barrel chest. His daughter, my grandmother was about 5' 10" tall herself.

My grandmother, Kendall & Mary's child, was Mabel Sanborn, born in Saratoga CA in 1879 and died 15 Jan 1948 in Willits CA at age 69. Mabel married Rafe S Beard, son of James Beard; Rafe's mother was an Estle.

My grandmother, Mabel, received an inheritance from a Sanborn first cousin in the late 1940s. I do not have any of those papers, but recall seeing them as a child and there was much talk in the family about the inheritance being connected to the Chase & Sanborn Coffee Co. It was a sizable amount considering the times. Mabel remembered meeting this cousin once when she was 12 years old (1891). He was about the same age as she. This cousin & his family made the trip to CA either from the East Coast, or possibly from England. In the talk about the inheritance, comment was made that a portion of the money had been taken by the British government with a tax before it was sent to Mabel in the 1940s.

We know nothing else about Kendall and have no knowledge of his siblings other than that one visit in the late 19th century. If anyone has information about Kendall or his siblings, I would like to make contact with them.

SANBORN FAMILY ASSOCIATION ANNUAL MEETING

5-6 August 2000*

The Annual Meeting began on 5 Aug at 9 am with registration. Tables were set up for sales and the Scotch Auction, thanks to our dedicated volunteers. Coffee, juice, and soft drinks were available. Members met and greeted old friends and new.

At 10 am two meetings started in separate rooms: Meeting A, "Sanborn Family Research on the Internet" was very ably led by Jim Sanborn Davidson, Reunion Chairman, of Rutland VT. Meeting B, "Family Photos: Caring & Sharing" was capably led by Karen Sanborn, Coordinator of Media Center, Castleton State College, Castleton VT. Both meetings were most informative and very well received. At 11 am audiences swapped places and the meetings were rerun.

12 noon to 1 pm a delicious buffet dinner was enjoyed as the Sales and Scotch Auction items were looked over.

At 1 pm President Roscoe E Sanborn opened the business meeting by greeting the assembled members and thanking his Board of Directors & the volunteers. He read a short devotional reading. The traditional roll call of descendents showed 8 from William, 29 from John, and 0 from Stephen.

The oldest member present was Ruth Sanborn King of Concord NH at 90 years. The youngest was Jonathan Fulk, 10 years, grandson of Edwin & Helen Sanborn of Laconia NH. The person coming the farthest was Richard Batchelder of Huntington Beach CA, who is also our newest Life Member. Next came the roll call of states. As usual, more members came from the New England area. Members also came from NJ, PA, NY, CA, & LA.

Former SFA secretary Ruth MacPherson read the Secretary's report as submitted by secretary Priscilla Watts. A vote to accept the report as read was passed unanimously. Ruth Norcross, Treasurer, read her Treasurer's report. It was moved by Jim Davidson & seconded by Sanborn Partridge the report be accepted subject to audit. This passed unanimously. Next Roscoe read the written report of Charles Watson, editor of *Sanborn Signatures*. He thanked all who had submitted articles and items of Sanborn information and issued a plea for more articles of Sanborn interest. Here Ed Fowler of Candia suggested that the two excellent meetings held this morning be written up as articles for *Sanborn Signatures*. Jim Davidson indicated he would see to this.

The scholarship drawing was announced next and a lengthy discussion ensued over criteria used and membership notification, etc. Mike Donnelly explained the lottery method chosen was the least biased available. A motion by Jim Davidson to table discussion on the scholarship until the bylaws had been dealt with was seconded by Sanborn Partridge and unanimously passed.

During a lengthy discussion on the copy of the proposed new bylaws, it was noted by Mike Donnelly that these were only an outline for filling in where pertinent, by the persons being affected, hence the appearance of being "open ended". Jim Davidson put forth the motion that "Whereas the present assembly of Sanborn Family Association members fully support the Board in completing new bylaws necessary for getting federal tax exemption, that the Board work on completing the bylaws and mail them to the membership for ratification". Sanborn Partridge indicated he would second this if Jim would put the time limit of one year on his motion. Jim agreed. The motion was made and seconded. It passed unanimously.

Ed Fowler of Candia NH stated that since the reason for tabling the discussion on the scholarship was to discuss the bylaws which had just been discussed, the scholarship discussion might now be reopened.

Robert Parker of Maine stated that inasmuch as the scholarships had been announced in *Sanborn Signatures* and applications received, we should honor these applications.

He made this into a motion. It was seconded by Ruth MacPherson and passed unanimously.

Mike Donnelly announced the winners of the first Sanborn Family Association Scholarships of \$100.00 each: Hana Elizabeth Wills of Benicia CA – Humboldt State University; and Katrina Ruthann Wills of Benicia CA – Benicia High School. They are the grand daughters of Ruth E Baird of Pasadena CA who has sent us extensive Sanborn lineage information including some Sanborn roots in Australia.

President Roscoe E Sanborn read the report of Nominating Committee Chairman Homer Sanborn, presenting the following slate of officers for the year ensuing: President – Everett Sanborn, Andover NH; Vice President – Marion Sanborn, Andover NH; Secretary – Priscilla Watts, Deerfield NH; Treasurer – Ruth Norcross, Arlington MA; Genealogist – George F Sanborn Jr, Derry NH; Archivist – Elizabeth A Sanborn, Candia NH. Moved by Jim Davidson that the assistant secretary, Ruth Sanborn, cast one ballot for the slate of officers. This was seconded by Irene Crowley, Norwood MA, and passed unanimously.

The raffle for the VC Sanborn book, *Genealogy of the Family of Samborne or Sanborn in England and America, 1194-1899*, was won by Ruth Norcross, Arlington MA. The Scotch Auction was held with the aid of Everett & Marion Sanborn and announcing by Richard Norcross. It netted \$232.00 for the Scholarship fund.

After the election of the officers for the coming year, Roscoe E Sanborn introduced the new President, Everett Sanborn of Andover NH, and turned the meeting over to him. The meeting closed at 3:25 pm with the singing of the Sanborn song as written by Elizabeth A Sanborn of Candia NH.
