WEST TO MEDFORD

Ardith James

While researching an Adler family of Prussian origin who settled in Medford, Dakota Territory, in the early 1880's, I learned that the founder of the town was a SANBORN. That item piqued my curiosity, of course! In 1879 Josiah B Sanborn was the original and only squatter in the area which would later become Medford, Walsh County, North Dakota. The filing for land took place in 1881, which year coincided with the formation of the county. One year later the township was organized and named for Sanborn's former home town of Medford, Minnesota, a small community located between Faribault and Owatonna, in the southeastern part of that state.

Josiah B Sanborn, born at Alexandria, New Hampshire, in 1839, was the son of Ezekiel (VCSanborn #1476) Sanborn and his wife, Lorinda (Bean) Sawyer. The family was of Groton NH near Newfound Lake, before moving to Medford MN where several Sanborn and Sawyer kin also lived. Josiah and his wife Harriet had six children living in MN at the time he set out for Dakota. The names of three of those children have been recorded as Colby, Frank, and Olive Sanborn.

Others also went to Medford ND from the MN town of the same name. The grown children of Josiah's sister, Mariella [Mary Ella in VCSanborn] Sanborn Jeffrey (1835-1879), were among the first to settle near their uncle. Anna Louise Jeffrey, known as "Nina", was a graduate of Carleton College who came to Medford to teach school. There she married David Robertson. Her sister Edith Jeffrey married George Cass, and her brother Ed Jeffrey remained a bachelor. Sherburn Sanborn Worthing, who became the first postmaster of Medford, Dakota, and his brother, Frank, also made the move from Medford MN.

A group of folks arrived from Pine Island MN including Augustus H Kellogg, who enumerated the Pine Island census of 1880 and, later, the Medford ND census of 1900. Kellogg's wife was the former Laura Worthing Baker of Bristol NH. Before living in Pine Island their home was in Red Wing MN. Also from Red Wing and Pine Island were the Prussian Adlers whom I'd been researching. They had made the journey to Medford ND in a covered wagon.

In the 1880's the nearest railroad went only as far as Grand Forks ND which was nearly sixty miles from Medford. Consequently, the early settlers came by oxen-drawn wagons, on horseback, or by foot. Among their numbers, in addition to the New Englanders, were Swedes, Norwegians, Germans, Scots, and

Canadians--the latter often coming by boat via the Red River of the North, from Winnipeg.

Unique to northeastern Dakota and northwestern MN were the Red River carts which, in Walsh Co, were used in the summer months to deliver mail and supplies. Trappers used them to transport furs to the Mississippi River port of St Paul. These carts, which were pulled by a pony, horse or ox, were able to travel up to 20 miles a day, with the driver walking alongside. They were made entirely of wood and had two wooden wheels which measured five feet in diameter. No axle grease was used so the wheels squawked loudly. The noise from a group of several carts could be heard from a quarter mile away. The Red River cart was well suited for use on the uneven prairie sod, in bogs, and soft clay. The cart was the creation of the métis, who were the offspring of French traders and Chippewa or Cree women.

By 1905 the Soo Line Railroad built tracks from Thief River Falls MN westward through Medford ND to Kenmare ND. The opening of the "WHEAT LINE" was followed by brisk sales of property in Medford Township and elsewhere. However, because two stations on the Soo Line named Medford, caused much confusion for the railroad, the locals decided to change the name of the ND town to Fordville, Walsh County. It became the junction point of the Soo and Drake lines.

One year later Fordville's population reached 120; today it is a town with 300+ residents. Perhaps there are still some Sanborn descendants among them. Josiah Sanborn is not mentioned again in the county history, so his story remains unfinished.

A NEW MUSEUM FOR MANCHESTER

Ardith James

The MILLYARD MUSEUM, which opened in the spring of 2001, joins the ranks of several other fine museums in Manchester NH including the Currier Gallery of Art and the Franco-American Centre.

Don't let the term "Millyard" fool you. This museum has much to offer and does it with clever displays, multi-media exhibits, and walking tours. It is not just the story of the textile mills' impact on the economy of both the city and state; it is much more.

At the Millyard Museum, one can see the penstocks which carried water to the turbines; Indian artifacts which were recovered from the banks of the Merrimack River; 19th century home furnishings and a mourning wreath of woven hair; a railroad engine which was built locally; a display of Victorian shop windows; personal items of mill workers and pictures of their homes, revealing great ethnic diversity; and wonderful photographs of Manchester from the 1840's through the early 1900's. The story of the children employed by the mills is especially touching.

In the section, "Homes for the Middle Class", there is a large photograph of the ALPHONSO H SANBORN house circa 1910-1918. Sanborn (VCSanborn #1539-ii) was employed as a draftsman and, later, in management at the Amoskeag Manufacturing Company. Sanborn's wife, Abigail, is shown on the front porch with her sister, Mrs Glines, in another large photograph.

The Manchester Historic Association has cleverly converted part of the Amoskeag Mill No. 3, at the corner of Pleasant and Commercial Streets, into a fascinating museum for children and adults. It is open Tuesday through Saturday 10 AM - 4 PM; Sunday noon to 4 PM. Admission \$5 adults, \$4 seniors/students; \$2 children ages 2-18. Members of the Association are admitted free. ABBY MERRILL – WIFE OF QUINTUS COLUMBUS SANBORN

[Editor's note: the following information about Abby Merrill was collected by Warren Merrill, emailed to Richard Sanborn, and forwarded by Richard to me. I have made some minor editorial changes to make it read more like an article]

Abby Merrill married Quintus Columbus Sanborn [VCSanborn #907] on 17 Oct 1858. She was born 28 May 1825 in NH and died in Pardeeville WI on 19 Feb 1906. [ed:



V C Sanborn states that she was the daughter of John Merrill and the widow of Luther J Elliott of Dorchester NH at the time of her marriage to Q C Sanborn.]

Abby's middle initial "R" is believed to stand for Rhoda, her mother's name. Musgrove's History of the Town of Bristol, New Hampshire incorrectly gives it as "B". The WI 1870 census incorrectly gives her name as "Aba".

It is not clear whether Abby was born in the town of Hill or Bristol NH. Hill was known as New Chester when she was born in 1825; the name of the town was changed in 1837. The town of Bristol was taken from New Chester in 1819. When a birth certificate was requested from the state of NH in July 1999, no record was found.

Her first husband, Luther J Elliot, died in 1857 and Abby married Quintus C Sanborn the next year. Shortly after their marriage they moved to Wyocena Township WI. She apparently was the first of this branch of the Merrill family to move to Wyocena. The move was probably in 1860 after the census was taken in WI as she does not appear in that census. A check of the NH 1860 census should clarify this point.

The WI 1870 census shows that the Quintus & Abby household in WI included 6 children: their own children Ira B, Quintus W, & John Merrill Sanborn; and 3 other children: William Merrill, 14, b NH, Abby Merrill, 13, born NH, and John Crooks, 10, born NY. William Merrill may have been the son of Abby's brother, William C Merrill, who reportedly moved to NY after his wife died, remarried and raised a large family. The young Abby may have been Abby E Merrill, the daughter of Abby's brother, Charles C Merrill.

This Charles Merrill went to visit her in 1861 and ended up joining the 10th Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry Regiment in Wyocena Township. Her parents, John & Rhoda Merrill, also migrated to Wyocena in 1867, after having made a visit there in 1865, probably to visit both Abby & her brother Peter who had himself migrated to Wyocena in 1864.

Abby inherited an 80 acre farm west of Pardeeville from her father. She & Quintus (died 4 July 1902) are buried in Pardeeville Cemetery.

"MEMORIES OF WINNIPESAUKEE FARM"

[Editor's note: apologies – I've forgotten who sent this to me. This is an article from *The Weirs Times* [NH], 21 Sep 2000. It is not clear to me who the author is, perhaps a Virginia Spenfellner of Eustis FL or a reporter for the Times. Ms Spenfellner is a grand daughter of Elmer Sanborn. In addition to the article, there are 5 photos of the farm buildings from about 1940.]

"Winnipesaukee farm was owned and operated by G. Elmer and Florence Sanborn. The property had been owned by generations of Sanborns. At one time, the property was traced back to a land grant from England.

In his younger years, Elmer was employed by the Laconia Car Co. After the company closed, Elmer operated a steamboat, the Osceola, from Lakeport, chartered for fishing parties. He had a great knowledge of the lake and its changeable weather. During the Lakeport fire in the early 1900's, the dock and steamboat burned.

Due to lack of employment, Elmer moved his young family back to the farm and started taking boarders. The business progressed and prospered, especially in the late 30's and 40s. During the summer season, the farm accommodated 75 guests and 10 employees. Meals were ample and delicious, with a single menu selection and the dinner bell was rung for all the guests. One cook and four waitresses served the hungry diners. Milk cows were rented to add to the farm herd from a local farmer, work horses supplied the labor for the chores of haymaking, vegetable gardening, maple syruping and ice cutting. At one time, two underground ice houses stored enough ice for the summer guest season. Fresh milk was served and breakfast eggs were supplied from the farm flock of chickens. In the early years, Elmer installed his own electrical supply and a hotel washer and ice cream maker were run by a variety of pulleys in the farmhouse cellar.

Elmer was an active member of the Laconia Rotary and the couple were Past Patron and Matron of the Laconia Eastern Star

Winnipesaukee Farm was located on the Weirs-Gilford Road at the intersection of the Lily Pond and Dockham Shore Roads. The main house and Cape Cod cottage remain, the latter still owned by grandchildren of the Sanborn family."

ARTHUR LOOMIS SANBORN

[editor: the following biography was sent by Richard H Sanborn. It was found online; therefore, the postscript notice is printed here. The biography is taken from a book, Men of Progress -- Wisconsin (by Andrew J Aikens & Lewis A Proctor, published in Milwaukee, 1897?). The subject of the biography is Judge Arthur Loomis Sanborn (VCSanborn #1705)].

SANBORN, A.L., a resident of Madison and one of the foremost members of the bar of that city, is descended from Lieutenant John Sanborn, an English soldier who settled in New Hampshire in colonial days, and from whom the village of Sanbornton is named, and by whose descendants it has been principally populated. From this colony the Sanborns have spread into adjoining states, New York and the northwest. S.E. and Harriet Blount Sanborn, the parents of the subject of this sketch, had settled in Brasher Falls, St. Lawrence county, N.Y., and here he was born November 17th, 1850. In 1858 the family moved to Geneva, Walworth county, Wisconsin, where, in 1861, the father died, leaving his wife and two sons in straightened circumstances. The boy, Arthur, was but eleven years old when his father died, and it became necessary for him to contribute to the support of the family, which he did by working in a woolen mill. Educational privileges were sacrificed to this dire necessity, but the boy was fond of study, and by using his evenings and what leisure moments he had, he was enabled to secure what was nearly equivalent to a high school education.

In 1869 the family moved to Elkhorn, and there the boy, now approaching manhood, secured a clerkship in the office of the register of deeds. This gave him the opportunity which he sought for preparation for a profession, and he began reading law. Meantime, he was elected register himself, and held the office for two terms or four years, at the end of which he was admitted to the bar. Not satisfied with this, however, he went to Madison and took a course in the law department of the university, completing it 1880. Before the course was ended he formed a law partnership with S.U. Pinney, now associate justice of the supreme court. This partnership was continued until January, 1892, when Mr. Pinney took his seat on the supreme bench. The firm of Pinney & Sanborn became widely known through its conducting a number of very important and extended railroad cases. For something over a year after Judge Pinney's withdrawal from the firm, James B. Kerr was associated with Mr. Sanborn; but, in April, 1893, the firm of Spooner, Sanborn & Spooner was formed. Senator Spooner being at the head. The business of this firm embraces large and intricate cases such as the land and tax litigation in Superior, involving over \$1,000,000, and the details of these cases have been largely in the hands of Mr. Sanborn. The land title cases have been carried to the United States supreme court at Washington, before which he presented the issues involved.

Mr. Sanborn, in connection with Mr. Berryman, in charge of the state law library, has published, as a supplement to the revised statutes, what is called "Sanborn & Berryman's Annotated Statutes," bringing the legislation since 1878 down to 1889, and they are now authorized to continue the work down to January 1st, 1898. Mr. Sanborn was, for three years, from 1886, a lecturer in the law department of the uni-

versity, his theme being pleading and practice.

In politics Mr. Sanborn is a Republican, and has been of much service in promoting the interest and principles of the party, but always in a clean and honorable way, for he hates anything else in political work.

Mr. Sanborn was married, in 1874, to a lady of Elkhorn, Miss Alice Golder, and they have four children – John B., Kate, Eugene and Philip. The eldest graduated from the state university in June, 1896, having distinguished himself in college journalism. They have a pleasant home on Mendota lake, the largest of the "four lakes of Madison."

Mr. Sanborn is a tireless worker, or he never could have accomplished what he has. He is of a judicial turn of mind and possesses the material out of which good judges are made.

Sanborn Family. "The first reunion of the Sanborn family, which promises to be an annual event hereafter, was held with Postmaster and Mrs. Benjamin E. Sanborn [VCSanborn 897 i] of Leavitt's Hill, South Deerfield, August 30, at the old Sanborn homestead where Mr. Sanborn, who has rounded out fifty years of service in the postal service was born eighty years ago last March.

The guests unanimously decided to hold another reunion next year with Mrs. Alice Carleton of Nottingham, the latter part of August. Following dinner, served in the hall over Mr. Sanborn's general store, which, by the way, has been in the Sanborn family for more than three-quarters of a century, a business meeting was held at which the following officers were chosen: President, Fred Sanborn Arnold, Jamaica Plain, Mass.; vice president, Miss Anna Cross, Nashua; secretary and treasurer, Mrs. Clyde Parker, Manchester; and assistant secretary and treasurer, Mrs. Emma E. Arnold, Greenville."

SANBORN WALLETS

Enoch Sanborn's Wallet 1777

Enoch Sanborn's rather elaborate wallet is plain stitched needlepoint with a green silk lining to match the faded orange and black exterior. The wallet is approximately 8" x 9" with a double fold. His name and date, "Enoch Sanborn

1777", are an integral part of the needlepoint wallet. Enoch lived in the Sanborn's Cove area of what is now Machiasport. The Machias Union, October 13, 1885, wrote: "Mr. James Sanborn in Machiasport owns a pocket book that his grandfather, Enoch Sanborn, owned and used in 1777. Mr. James Sanborn owns and uses a wallet that he bought in 1828". James Sanborn's wallet has the words "bought off Charles Gates in 1828" written in ink on the inside. Charles Gates was the son of Nathan and Margaret Kingsley Gates, original owners of the Gates House. Both wallets were in the Sanborn home, later owned by the parents of Jennie Pettegrove Brown. Jennie donated the wallets to our Society in 1992.

other activists for safeguarding the purity of the white sand beaches of a 90 mile stretch of Florida's panhandle coast. They have supported stronger laws to regulate the color of and size of sand that might be imported for the beaches and they have monitored the beaches since about 1995. One result is beautiful beaches; another is the opposition of "Builders and developers, [who] of course, aren't happy with the beach puritanism."

Duane Crabtree sent in an article from the Bangor [ME] Daily News (internet edition) of late (26th?) September 2001 titled "Weather pushes oil to shore". It reports on a serious oil spill in Sanborn Pond, in Brooks, Waldo County, ME. The 87 acre pond had an oil spill on September 23 of 5600 gallons of thick No. 6 oil. The driver of a tank truck swerved to avoid a deer and crashed to the edge of Sanborn Pond, where the tanker broke open. The mess was being cleaned up but the long-term consequences were not known. A biologist for ME's Dept of Environmental Protection said it was the worst freshwater spill in ME in over 25 years.

In 1874 an Englishwoman Marion Herapath (1851-1914) married the Punch cartoonist, Edward Linley Sambourne (1844-1910). A few years ago (1994, 1st published 1988) a book was published by Alan Sutton Publishing of Dover NH: A Victorian Household - Based on the Diaries of Marion Sambourne, written by Shirley Nicholson. The ISBNs are 0-7509-0637-5 (paper) & 0-7509-0742-8 (hard) if you wish to borrow a copy via InterLibrary Loan at your local library. This book is based on the diaries that Marion kept for 33 years. To quote from the book jacket: "In it she recorded not only what she did, but the minutiae of daily life in a Victorian household - where she shopped, what the family ate, who came to call. She also made notes on dinner parties, wrote instructions for the servants, and made inventories of household items. Every thing is recorded from the price of hairpins (2d) to her opinion of Harrods ('dirty place, though cheap'), the upheaval of their annual holiday at the seaside (To Ramsgate by 12.15 train. 19 large boxes, 17 small, two dogs and six birds'), and tart asides on those she meets ('Rather slow dinner. O [Oscar] Wilde sat next to me & spilt all his claret all over my dress'). Fascinating for their everyday detail, these diaries are particularly interesting to us today because the house in which Marion spent her married life -18 Stafford Terrace, Kensington [London, England] - has now been perfectly preserved, all its contents intact. This book provides an intimate and absorbing account of the inner lives and thoughts of the family who lived there a hundred years ago."

"Master Clarence Eugene Sanborn gave a very enjoyable party to several of his young friends Monday afternoon, in observance of his 6th birthday anniversary at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Emery Sanborn, Oak street, from 2.30 to 5. Games were enjoyed upon the lawn, also selections upon the victrola. Refreshments of ice cream, cake, fruit, candies and punch were served. The young host was made the happy recipient of many pretty gifts from his young friends. Those present were: Violet Stanton, Virginia Green, Harlan Thombs, Mabel Thombs, Alma Thombs, Eleanor Watson, Madeline Austin, Phyllis Frank, Wilma Frank, Zane Loring, Mildred Roberts, Everett Hawkes, Billy Dyer, Ellen Dyer, Mrs. Joseph Loring, Mrs. Cyrus Hawkes, Mrs. Althea Goodwin, Mrs. Emery Sanborn, Lucretia Geary, Kermit Geary." Portland [ME] Herald, 19 Jul 1921 [editor: please note the year].

Dick Sanborn sent me the following item from a 17 Oct 1863 New York Herald. His son, Scott, saw it on E-Bay & bought it for his dad, Dick. The latter reports that Scott collects Sanborn antiques, particularly Chase & Sanborn items. Perhaps we can convince him to describe his collection for a future Sanborn Signatures? The editor also wonders if anyone has further information on the Sanborn referred to in the arti-"Dr. Wright to be Executed. Is the tenor of an order issued by Major General Foster on the 10th inst. It will be remembered that Dr. Wright shot Lieutenant Sanborn, an officer commanding a Negro company at Norfolk, some time in June, for which he was tried by a military court martial. Great efforts were made by his friends to induce the President to revoke the sentence of the court, and it was at one time thought that a plea of insanity had effected that object, and that Dr. Wright was to be sent to a lunatic asylum; but the following general order demonstrates otherwise; - General Orders - No. 17. Headquarters, Department of Virginia and North Carolina, Fortress Monroe, Va., Oct. 10, 1863 The proceedings of the military commission instituted for the trial of David M. Wright, of Norfolk, Va., by Special orders No. 195, 196 and 197 of 1863, from the headquarters of the Department of Virginia, having, in accordance with section



five of the act of Congress, approved July 17, 1863, been submitted to the President of the United States, and the sentence been approved, and the execution ordered by the President at such time and place as the Major General commanding the department may appoint, it is therefor ordered that the sentence that 'the accused, David M. Wright, of Norfolk, be hanged by the neck until he be dead', be carried into execution on Friday next, the 16th day of October, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, at such place in or near Norfolk as Brigadier General James Barnes, commanding United States forces at that place, may be designated. By command of Major General Foster. Southard Hoffman, Assistant Adjutant General."
