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RECOLLECTIONS OF SEVENTY YEARS By F B Sanborn

[Editor's note: SFA member, and presenter at the 2000 Annual Meeting, Karen Sanborn of Castleton VT has kindly donated a book to the SFA. The Board decided to retain the volume in its Archives in order to preserve it for the SFA. Just to see what the author had to say, I began to browse through the introductory matter and have gotten enthralled with Franklin Benjamin Sanborn's life; he was "Frank" to his friends all his life. He was also the father of V C Sanborn, author of our family genealogy. The donated volume is the first of two; this first volume covers his life up to 1860. He does go off on lengthy tangents about national politics and well-known figures in public life.

The bibliographic details are: Recollections of Seventy Years, by F B Sanborn of Concord [MA], in two volumes, volume one; Boston: Richard G Badger, The Gorham Press, 1909. There are a number of illustrations in the book although some are missing from our copy.

I am going to begin printing extracts from this volume and will continue this from time to time. My focus will be on Sanborn himself and his family. I will skip most of the tangents. Whenever you see 3 dots, material has been omitted. Any additions by the editor will be in square brackets; original page numbers will also be in square brackets.]

[page 13] Chapter I. Preliminary. This day, July 6, 1908, I begin such Recollections of my life and my acquaintances as occur to me, and have not been published elsewhere; including, however, many things which I have printed publicly or privately during the past half century; in course of which I have recalled and written out particulars that may be useful to me in this volume. ...

I am now well along in my seventy-eighth year, having been born (on the estate of my ancestors for six generations, at Hampton Falls, N. H., and in a dwelling house now 165 years old) on the 15th of December, 1831; the son of Aaron Sanborn, then Town Clerk of the small municipality, and [14] Lydia Leavitt, his wife - the fifth of their seven children, of whom the eldest died in infancy. I was the second son, my older brother, the late Dr. Charles Henry Sanborn, being ten years my senior, and my youngest brother, Joseph Leavitt Sanborn, who died at St. Louis, Mo., in 1872, being twelve years younger than myself. An intermediate brother, Lewis Thomas Sanborn, was born in October, 1834; and my two sisters, Sarah Elizabeth and Helen Maria, had been born, respectively, in 1823 and 1830. My name, which is peculiar in its arrangement (Franklin Benjamin, instead of the customary Benjamin Franklin), is due to a whim of my father, who, as Town Clerk, could enter me by any name he pleased. I was really named for my grandfather, Benjamin Sanborn,

and his father of the same name, which he took from a worthy uncle, Deacon Benjamin, grandson of the first emigrant Sanborn, John by name, who was a grandson of the founder of Hampton, Rev. Stephen Bachiler, an Oxford scholar of Queen Elizabeth's reign. But my Grandmother Leavitt, when I went to see her in the fine house under the four elms on the Kensington road, in view of the lovely Kensington hills, used to put her gentle hand on my head and call me "her little Dr. Franklin," and so the great doctor's surname was given me for a middle name. But my father, foreseeing that I should be called "Frank," as I always have been, declared that his son should not be known by his middle name, and therefore registered me in the reverse order of the two names.

[15] It is a serious thought that I am now several years older than my father, who died in 1866, at 73, and but a few months younger than my Grandfather Leavitt, the squire of his neighborhood, who died before he was 78, in 1852. But my Grandfather Sanborn lived to be 87, and my mother to be 83 - so that I may still have several years of inherited longevity before me. It is from the mother's side that we four brothers and my younger sister take our physical inheritance, though not her extreme beauty. She was of fair complexion, good feminine stature, with blue eyes, thick jet-black hair, a brilliant color, and a most amiable expression. My father was brown-haired, with dark eyes and of tall and slender stature, though of stalwart strength; a daring horseman, and deft with his hands for almost any farming or mechanical labor. His mood was serious, and in his later years stoical, with a touch of the cynic; upright and charitable, but seldom gracious, except to the poor, and rather severe with his children, who grew up to hold opinions quite unlike his own. In this he was the reverse of his father, who was the type of a smiling English yeoman, full of good will and hospitality, and at peace with all the world. He died when I was sixteen, but I do not remember that I ever heard from him a harsh or offensive word. In my childhood I slept with him, and had much of his society at other times. One of my earliest recollections is of being put early into his great bed, by which my beautiful mother sat and sung to me in her sweet voice, to a Hebrew air - [16] Hush, my dear - lie still and slumber! / Holy angels guard thy bed; / Heavenly blessings without number / Gently falling on thy head. This was before I was three years old; and

soon after I recall trying to lift my little legs up a steep flight of stairs, which I never could identify afterward, until many years later I found they were the garret stairs in my greatgrandfather's house, near Munt Hill.

My two great-grandmothers, neither of whom I ever saw, Anna Towle and Esther Towle (who were second cousins), seem to have introduced into the Sanborn and the Leavitt families the tall stature and great strength that distinguished some of their descendants. Anna Towle, the widow of Benjamin Sanborn, owned this old house near Munt Hill (a ledge celebrated in tradition as the occasional home of an Indian chief), and her gigantic son John lived in a cottage near by. A younger son, Jeremy, his mother's darling, died at nineteen, in her house (1786), and she is said never to have sat at her table with the household afterward, though she lived until 1823, when she must have been ninety years old. Her young son's tall clock then fell to his brother, my grandfather, and still ticks the solemn time in the "clock-room" of the house where I was born - the large room where in winter we dined, and where I studied Latin, French, Greek, and German, before I ever thought of going to Harvard College.

[18] From this Social library, of which my father was a share-holder, I borrowed and read "Plutarch's Lives" (Langhorne's translation) before I was eight years old, and had read most of its few hundred books before beginning, at about fourteen, to read the Langdon volumes [this had volumes in Latin & Greek as well as English]. At the age of eleven a lively young schoolmaster, Barber, of Epping, induced me to begin the Greek grammar, and I had learned the alphabet and the first paradigms when my father sent word to my teacher that I was too young for that study. I was already entered in Latin, and read along by myself for several years, in Liber Primus, Nepos, the "Colloquies of Erasmus" (of which, as well as of Terence, I found a copy in the Langdon library), and Virgil. I took up Greek again in 1846, at the age of lifteen or earlier, and have never given it up since.

My religious education was hardly so early and continuous as my literary studies. My grandparents in both families, and their fathers, had been loyal parishioners of Dr. Langdon [Congregational church]; but after his death, in 1797, although, from our own house, so near the church, the fami-



ly went to meeting in the old way, my Grandfather Leavitt, the Jeffersonian justice of the peace, more for political than spiritual reasons, I fancy, joined the seceding Baptists, and refused to pay his church-rates, which were then assessed by the town. This led to his arrest, and made him more a political leader than before; for while the Congregationalists or the "standing [19] order" were generally Federalists, the sects (Baptists, Methodists, etc.) were apt to be Jeffersonian Republicans. Squire Tom's first commission as justice was given him by John Langdon, the Jeffersonian leader in New Hampshire, and he was proud of that honor. Every succeeding Governor renewed the commission, until my grandfather's death, in 1852; and he continued to be a Democratic leader in Rockingham County until the party hopelessly divided on the issue of Texas annexation, in 1844-5. Meanwhile he had left the Baptists, who were Calvinists, and organized a small Universalist society in Hampton Falls, of which my father (his son-in-law) and his brother, Joseph Sanborn, were members, and which their father, "Grandsir Sanborn," good-naturedly joined, having already given up his Federalists politics and followed Adams, at first, and then Jackson, into the reorganized Democracy, in 1828-30. These Universalists never settled a pastor, but had preaching in schoolhouses and private parlors for a few years, set up a theological library, the books of which were soon distributed among the faithful; and eventually, about 1838, became Unitarians. ... But neither of my grandfathers, nor my father and his brother, went often to church, although the women of their families did; and it was not required of me, as a child, to go regularly, or to attend the Sunday school. I read the Univer- [20] salist and Unitarian books, was familiar with the Bible, and at the mature age of nine, after reading how Origen and other Greek fathers believed in a final salvation for all, I declared myself a Universalist. 1 believe 1 never heard a Universalist preacher until I entered college, but took up the habit of going among the Baptists, the Congregationalists, and others, wherever there was good preaching and singing. A VISIT TO SPRINGFIELD NH

Shortly after a copy of the Fall 2000 Sanborn Signatures article on Caleb Sanborn [VCS #357 v] reached the Springfield NH Historic Society, I received a thank you and an invitation to come to the town for a visit.

As it turned out, my husband and I decided to attend a "Revolutionary War" Elderhostel at West Dover, VT in July, so it was a perfect time to make a side trip to Springfield to see the area where Caleb grew up.

Since I am a member of P.E.O. and enjoy staying at P.E.O. bed

and breakfast homes, I had phoned the area contact person in Grantham NH who arranged for Jim and me to stay at a "lovely farmhouse" on a hilltop in Springfield. Imagine my delight when we arrived there and were told that the original part of the house was built over 200 years ago and the owner of the farm at one time was Abraham Sanborn, father of Caleb. The idea of a connection to Caleb's family was an enormous thrill for me, since I had spent more than a year and a half researching his story! Jim and I stayed in that original section of the house – most likely the same rooms that Caleb knew very well.

The next day we met with Murial Tinkham of the local historic society. She was most gracious and showed us around the area, pointing out the various Sanborn-built homes on Sanborn Hill Road and the Sanborn graves in two cemeteries. (Yes, we found the graves of Abraham and Sarah, Caleb's parents; their markers were considerably tilted forward, so the inscriptions were hard to read.) Then Muriel took us to the historic society's building and showed us the Sanborn material on file there.

It soon became obvious that Abraham [VCS #357] was not the only early Sanborn in town. In fact there was very little information on him and his brothers, Jonathan [VCS #354] and Joseph [VCS #355], who also came to Springfield. There were, however, records on the family of Reuben [VCS #241] and his sons, Richard [VCS #634] and Robert [VCS #635]. I left copies of all that I had on Caleb's family and have, since then, sent to Springfield enough material to provide a better understanding of Reuben's Sanborn origins, as well.

Thanks to our hosts and to our historian, Muriel, for a fine time! Such hospitality and exchanges certainly enrich our lives.

Late last year George Hancock of Naples FL made contact with the Editor about two photo albums he had purchased. They came from the William Henry Sanborn family. He is VCS #1496 iv; his brother's family, Nathan Chase Sanborn VCS #1496 iii, is also in the albums. There are about 102 photos in the two albums. There are photos of Wm Henry (b 1840) & wife Sarah (b 1842), their children, Owen (b 1869), Edwin (b 1872), Harvey (b 1881), & Amy (b 1886); Wm Henry's sister & husband, Sarah (b 1844) & Daniel Card; Wm Henry's brother & wife, Nathan (b 1837) & Hannah (b 1835), & their son & wife & child, George A (b 1864), Nettie (b 1864), & Roland (b 1893); plus inlaws. Also members of Tyler & Hanson families. Some of the photos are 5x7 and some are tintypes. According to V C Sanborn, Wm Henry lived in Gonic NH & Nathan in Rochester NH.

Mr Hancock believes that the albums passed to Amy Elizabeth Sanborn Rawson (1886-1945), daughter of Wm Henry; then to Amy's daughter, Elizabeth Agnes Rawson Sprague (1917-2000). Upon the latter's death the albums got out of the family. Mr Hancock would like to see that they get to descendants of the people in the photos or to the SFA. He is willing to sell them for what he paid plus \$10 postage. The SFA Board decided that they couldn't purchase them directly. The Board would be happy, of course, if a member chose to

buy them & donate them, now or later, to the SFA. Alternatively, it would be nice if a descendant chose to purchase them. I am printing three examples from the albums. EARLY SANBORNS

I'm not sure if this item belongs in the "Early Sanborns" or in "Sanborns in the News". Dick Sanborn sent me the web description of Sanborn Library at Dartmouth College. It is a wing on the main Dartmouth College Library: "Sanborn Library is renowned as one of the most beautiful rooms on campus. Providing a quiet retreat for study or relaxation, its collection focuses on standard works and criticism of English and American literature. Although much of its contents is duplicated in Baker Library, Sanborn offers a unique collection of contemporary poetry in English, as well as a collection of literary and dramatic sound recordings available for use in the library. Tea, a popular tradition open to all, is served in Sanborn Library every weekday afternoon in term at 4 PM." The librarian at the Sanborn Library sent the Editor an article from the Dartmouth Alumni Magazine about Sanborn Library and I hope to begin printing it in the Fall issue of Sanborn Signatures.

Thanks also to Dick Sanborn for sending on an item from *The Romance of Wisconsin Place Names*, by Robert E Gard & L G Sorden (NY: October House, 1968). It notes that Sanborn WI (Ashland County) was named after Senator A W Sanborn [state? Senator] who owned much land in northern WI. He seems to be the Albert Whittemore Sanborn in VCS #1543 i. VCS writes: that AWS was born in Swanton VT 17 Jan 1853, "a lawyer and a prominent man in Ashland, Wis."; he married Jessie L Walker (b 17 Dec 1862) of Stevens' Point WI 11 Jul 1884; and had at least 3 children – Norman Walker (26 Feb 1886), Albert Beckwith (12 Jun 1891), & Helen May (Aug 1894). Ashland, Ashland County, & Sanborn are all in northern WI, very close to Lake Superior.

Thanks to Dick Sanborn a 3rd time for passing on the following obit from the Sanborn online list: "New York (UP) – Pitts Sanborn, 61, noted music critic of the New York World Telegram, died in his apartment last night. Physicians believed he had succumbed to a heart attack, but an autopsy

will be performed today to determine the exact cause of death. A friend found him on the floor of the bath-room of his apartment a few hours after he had attended a performance at the Metropolitan Opera House. He had completed the first paragraph of his review when he was stricken. Recognized as one of the great contemporary authorities on the opera, Sanborn's writing embraced many fields. He was also widely known as a novelist, poet and essayist. At the time of his death he was serving as program annotater [sic] for the Philharmonic Symphony Society and was completing a biography of Kirstan Flagstad. Sanborn became music editor of the New York Globe in 1905, three years after he received his M.A. degree from Harvard. He continued in that position until 1923 when he transferred to the New York Evening Mail for which he was a foreign correspondent." This was in the Evening News of the Tonawandas [NY] 8 March 1941.

New SFA member, Joyce Allen-Luopa, has done extensive research on the Allen family, including its connection to the Sanborns. Thomas Sanborn (1811-75) of Sanbornton NH [VCS #1752] married Harriet Allen and had descendants. Thomas's cousin, Emeline B Sanborn (1823-) [VCS #1108 i], married Harriet's brother, David Allen Jr (1805-51). Lee H Sanborn sent in an article from the online archives of the local paper, Star-Banner (Ocala FL), www.Starbanner.com; click on 'History', 'Civil War', & finally the chapter titled "Captain J. J. Dickison: Marion County's Civil War Hero", written by Vince Murray. Capt Dickison led a small Confederate military unit that ambushed a US boat, the 132 ton armed steamtug Columbine, on the St John's River in May 1864 with sharpshooters & cannon. Murray describes this action:

"One of Dickison's first shots [from a cannon] – from sixty yards away – ripped into the Columbine's wheel chains and severed its steam lines. Powerless, the tug floated 200 yards down the river before running aground within 100 yards of Dickison's crack riflemen.

Acting Ensign Frank Sanborn took charge of the Columbine's forward gun, but after realizing the steam was gone, that Dickison's riflemen and Bates' grapeshot had cleared the quarterdeck, and that the aft gun had been abandoned, Sanborn left his position forward to evaluate the situation.

Electing to fight on, Sanborn sent Acting Master's Mate W.B. Spencer in an attempt to rally the infantry guard which was already going over the side. But with the decks raked by Confederate fire, the wheel jammed and the engine useless, the Federals finally ran up the white flag.

After the 45-minute firefight, Dickison and his outnumbered



force boarded the gunboat, and despite its potential as a prize, elected to burn it at sundown. Dickison decided to destroy the Columbine because the heavily-armed Ottawa, still under repair just a few miles away, remained a threat to Dickison's tiny force.

Only one Union officer, Sanborn, the commander of the Columbine, survived the attack. Forty-two rifles, five swords, eight pistols, four cutlasses and two thousand rounds of ammunition were among the captured goods. ...

Union losses were estimated at 91, including 20 killed, 65 taken prisoner and six wounded, while 57 escaped – a victory accomplished by less than 30 men – and a victory that further established the land west of the St. John's River as "Dixie"s land."

[Editor: question is - what happened to Sanborn? Did he survive capture?]

Marsha Wilgus sent me this biography of Ezra E Sanborn [VCS #366 v]. V C Sanborn has very little about Ezra, therefore these details add considerably to what we know about him. Marsha saw it on the web and in order to find it: type in the URL (web address) www.ukans.edu/carrie/kancoll Then click on (1) Andreas, (2) Nebraska, (3) index of County chapters, (4) Sarpy [County], (5) go to county, (6) Part 5: [Springfield] Biographical Sketches. This is an extract from A T Andreas, History of the State of Nebraska (Chicago: Western Historical Co, 1882). The town of Springfield was founded in Nov 1881 so Sanborn moved to a very new, very raw town in the making. The 2000 AAA atlas lists it with 1400 residents – it's located a few miles southwest of Omaha.

"Ezra E. Sanborn, P. O. Springfield, farmer and stock-grower, Section 9, Town 13, Range 11, was born in Weare, N. H., August 15, 1831. When one year of age, his father moved to Sutton, N. H. Mr. S. afterward went to Newport, N. H., and there learned the trade of tinsmith, and followed his trade in Cambridge and Boston and other places in Massachusetts for several years. In the spring of 1856, he started West, and landed in Buffalo with but 50 cents in his pockets. There he worked at his trade for a time, and then went to Chicago, feeling very despondent, but went into the manufacture of burning fluid, delivering it to customers, and made considerable money during the winter, when he sold out and purchased a team and wagon, a small stock of Yankee notions, and started for the frontier town of Omaha, in the spring of 1857, arriving there June 11. That season, [he] pre-empted one hundred and sixty acres of land in Washington County, and in the fall found work at his trade in the employ of Milton Rogers, of Council Bluffs, where he remained about two years, when he engaged in butchering, opening two meat markets, and furnishing supplies for the Government troops stationed at that place. In the fall of 1867 [sic, 1864?] he sold

out and returned to New Hampshire, to visit his old home, visiting Baltimore, Washington and other places. When returning to his father's home, in the stage, he found ex Gov. Colby a fellow-passenger, who was also a fellow-passenger in the same stage when he left home, about seven years before; also the same driver. In the spring of 1865, Mr. S. returned to the West, and in the spring of 1866 took a load of shingles from Omaha and went out to look at his land, the site of his present home, which he had owned for nine years, but which he had never seen. He was so discouraged at the outlook that he sold out his shingles to William Satterfield and returned to Omaha. However, afterward, he took a load of lumber out to his land and erected a cabin. It was all wild in that section. the nearest neighbors being about four miles distant. Deer could, for two or three years after, be seen almost any day in the vicinity of his cabin, and plenty of antelope on the high ground around. Mr. S. subsequently added to his original purchase of one hundred and sixty acres, other lands, and now owns in a square body six hundred and forty acres of choice farming land, which he is rapidly developing; and, besides grain-raising, he is largely engaged in stock-raising. He has an orchard of one thousand two hundred apple trees, one hundred of which are bearing. He has also experimented much in peach-growing, with varying success, though he has raised a great many peaches from three years' growth by . the seed. Mr. S. was married in Cambridge, Mass., March 20, 1865, to Miss Caroline L. Brown, of Cambridge. She was born in Wilmot, N. H., October 12, 1837. They have five children - Webster B., born April 1, 1866; Perley A., born June 4, 1869; Clifford Wayne, March 17, 1872; Mary F., born February 23, 1875, and Lavina J., June 12, 1878."

CLARA & JOHN SANBORN

The Editor has recently been doing some volunteer work at the RI State Archives in Providence. The work consists of sorting through the RI Adjutant General's records, placing like records together, flattening out folded documents, & placing them in properly labeled, acid-free file folders. This will make them far more accessible & there will be a computerized list of file folders for researchers to get fairly quickly to the folders they really want to see. Most of the records I've seen so far are Civil War documents & 1890s era documents – often in the same carton!

I came across a letter from a Clara G Sanborn of Great Falls NH dated 23 August 1865 and addressed to the RI Adjutant General. It reads: "Genl Mauran. Sir. I received a letter from my son John F Pyte. in June saying that he had sent me a check for fifty dollars. As I did not get the check I wrote to him for the No. of the check it is 2328, he did not say what on what Bank. [sic] My son is a private in the 3rd R.I. Cavalry



Co I. I went to Boston and saw the Adj GenI there and he advised me to write to you as he thought you could tell me how to get it. if you could help me to get it Sir it would be a great kindness as I am a widdow and poor [signed] Clara G Sanborn"

I don't know the result of this letter – whether or not she received a replacement check. In the Annual Report of the Adjutant General ... 1865, Vol II (Providence 1895, p 125, is the listing for John G [sic] Sanborn, private, Co 1, 1st [sic] Regt RI Cavalry; resided at Sandwich NH; enrolled 21 Nov 1861; mustered 17 Dec 1861; sick in hospital 31 Jan 1862; remustered as a Veteran Volunteer 5 Jan 1864. Transferred to the NH Cavalry by order of 7 Jan 1864. By the way, there were 3 other Sanborns from NH in the 1st Regt of RI Cavalry: Arthur L Sanborn [VCS #1194 xvi] of New Hampton, his brother James M [VCS #1194 xvi], and Clarence B of Sanbornton [VCS #1442 iii].

Does anyone recognize this John and Clara Sanborn? I couldn't find them in V C Sanborn. Please let the Editor know if anyone can identify John & Clara more fully. The source of the letter is: RI State Archives, Adjutant General Papers; Correspondence Received August 1865.

Sanborn was one of several veterans from the area who came into the classroom that day to talk about their lives as soldiers fighting far from home. On

Sanborn, who served as a combat engineer in World War II, said he enjoyed his day in the classroom, especially the interplay with students. 'They are pretty sharp boys and girls,' he said. He was a tall, skinny 19-year-old boy headed to a dangerous land an ocean away."

He served as a national campaign director of the Progressive Conservative party, was elected national president in 1964 & ran for Parliament in 1865 & 1968. He began his career as a newspaper columnist with the Toronto Telegram in the early 1960s and later joined the Toronto Star, where he wrote regular columns for more than 30 years. He published 4 books, Gentlemen, Players & Politicians, Points of Departure, Eclectic Ecl, and Whose Country Is This Anyway?. In 1977 he moved to NB, continued his columns for the Star and joined the weekly political panel of CBC's "Morningside". In 1986 he left NB for 2 years to serve in the Privy Council Office as senior adviser to the cabinet of Prime Minister Brian Mulroney. He returned to NB for good after the federal general election in 1988. In 1993 he became the oldest



Canadian to receive a heart transplant. Mr Camp contributed to a number of publications & delivered lectures at universities across Canada. At the time of his death, he was working on his memoirs. 
