#### SANBORN HOUSE, DARTMOUTH COLLEGE

[In the Spring 2002 issue of Sanborn Signatures, the first paragraph under "Early Sanborns" on page 5 referred to Sanborn Library at Dartmouth College. This library of English & American literature is contained in Sanborn House, a wing of the main College library. Sanborn House is named after Dartmouth Professor Edwin David Sanborn [VCSanborn #1152], Dartmouth class of 1832, Professor of English & Librarian of the College, among other Dartmouth offices. His son, David Webster Sanborn, Dartmouth 1878, died in 1928 & left money to build Sanborn House, to be named in honor of his father. The building would house the English department faculty, an English library, & rooms for English majors to meet. #### Sanborn English House Leon Burr Richardson

In a previous article of this series, relating to the Crosby family, something was said concerning social conditions in Hanover in the middle half of the nineteenth century. During that period, so far as the faculty was concerned, despite the wretched rate of remuneration and despite the excessive formality which prevailed in student relations, the teaching group was particularly strong and effective, both scholastically and personally, with an influence for good upon the undergraduate body which has not been surpassed in the whole history of the College. Among the men of this period, it is not unfair to say, the greatest force was Edwin David Sanborn, tutor in 1835; Associate Professor of Latin and Greek, 1835-1837; Professor of Latin, 1837-1859; Evans Professor of Oratory and Belles Lettres, 1863-1880; Winkley Professor of Anglo-Saxon and the English Language and Literature, 1880-1882; emeritus, 1882-1885.

Professor Sanborn, born at Gilmanton, N.H., in 1808, was graduated from Dartmouth in the class of 1832. Two of his brothers also received degrees from the College – John Sewall, 1842, who occupied important legal positions in Canada, rising to a judgeship on the Court of Queen's Bench, and Dyer Hook, honorary A.B. in 1841, distinguished as a teacher, grammarian and writer of widely used school texts. Upon graduation Edwin evidently was uncertain as to his future calling. For a time he taught at Andover and elsewhere, then he studied law, and finally decided upon the ministry, entering the Andover Theological Seminary with the class of

1837. In 1835, however, he accepted the position of tutor at Dartmouth, and thus entered upon a life work of teaching which was to last for 50 years, all of it, except for an interval from 1859 to 1863 when he was Professor Classical Literature and History at Washington University in St. Louis, devoted to his alma mater. He died in New York City in 1885.

The qualities which were especially to characterize Professor Sanborn soon became evident. He was a big man both in body and mind, possessed of a large measure of practical common sense and direct methods of thought and action. His reading was extensive and his memory prodigious. He had at his command, ready for instant use, an immense store of knowledge. This learning was coupled with a natural gift for instruction, which impressed his influence indelibly upon successive classes of Dartmouth undergraduates for nearly half a century. He was not a productive scholar in the modern sense, but his impact as a teacher had the advantage both of breadth of knowledge and range of sympathy which the modern scholar sometimes lacks. His acquirements extended over the whole field of ancient and modern literature, so that his success as a teacher of Latin and Greek - the position which he first occupied - was duplicated by his later work in English letters and literature.

Withal he was a man of singularly open habits of mind; positive, aggressive, not particularly solicitous of the effect which the expression of his honest opinions might have on others. He was intolerant of cant, insincerity and pretense. Thus on one occasion, when the subject of the weekly prayer meeting was "growing in grace," he listened with increasing impatience as his colleagues, one by one, developed the thesis (with modesty, it is to be hoped) of their own gradual increase in capacity to lead a good life. Finally, not being able to endure it longer, he broke in abruptly and brought to a sudden end this period of self-congratulation by the outburst, "I don't know about this growing in grace. I can't see that I have grown any in grace for the last twenty years and I can't see that any of you have grown either."

For years he held the onerous post of inspector of buildings and his reports to the Trustees lack nothing in clarity nor are marked by any measure of squeamishness in the description of the more disagreeable parts of his duties. Frequently he

did not see eye to eye with President Lord and he was especially disgusted at the advent of the Chandler School whereby certain of his scientific colleagues held by him, not personally but from the subject matter which they taught, in low esteem, had the opportunity of adding to their incomes by teaching in the School; an opportunity which was denied to the "literary" members of the faculty like himself, far more important, so he believed, in their influence upon the educational progress of the institution. He complained of this discrimination in emphatic language and it may well be that his departure to Washington University was based upon his resentment at this discrimination. He was in much demand for the supply of pulpits in the neighborhood, he delivered many occasional addresses, some of which were published, and he wrote a brief history of New Hampshire. He received the degree of LL.D. from the University of Vermont in 1859 and from Dartmouth in 1879. In 1848 he was a member of the legislature and in 1850 of the Constitutional Convention. Early in his teaching career he received from the students the nickname "Bully." At the start it may not have been given with complimentary intent, and he always detested its application, but as years went on it became a term which, in the minds of those who used it, indicated the respect and real affection in which the sturdy professor was held by the whole undergraduate body.

Professor Sanborn's home in Hanover was the large house to the west of the Green, built in the first decade of the nineteenth century by Dr. Cyrus Perkins, and afterwards occupied in turn by Presidents Brown and Tyler and Professor Oliver. Externally it was not an especially attractive dwelling but internally it was spacious enough. Particularly striking was the study of the professor, adorned by pictorial wall paper illustrating the Bay of Naples, so that his daughter Kate always maintained that she was born in the shadow of Vesuvius. As in the homes of the other professors, the living here was adequate, but simple; perhaps even primitive by modern standards. Professorial income had to be supplemented by the yield of a large garden, cultivated by professorial hands; domestic animals - at least a cow and pigs - were a necessary part of family possessions; in the fall supplies of provisions of home production - animal and vegetable - were stored away, as well as some forty or fifty



cords of wood, prepared for fireplace or stove. Many years later, Edwin, a son of the family, from his own bitter experience was inclined to place the peripatetic wood-sawing machine, animated by a horse power, as the greatest invention of the age, although he had ruefully to admit that the privilege of splitting and piling the wood by hand still remained unaffected by modern progress. Winters brought a succession of frozen pipes, burning chimneys and shivering nights spent in unheated bedrooms. But there was another side to the picture. The atmosphere was one of refinement and culture. Education began at home early and under the best of auspices. Distinguished visitors, coming to Hanover to lecture or for other purposes, in many cases were the guests of the Sanborns; if not, they always called on the distinguished professor to "pay their respects." It was under such favorable conditions that the Sanborn children were reared.

In 1837 Professor Sanborn married as his first wife Mary Ann, daughter of Ezekiel Webster (brother of Daniel). She died in 1864. A frequent member of the household was her mother, left a widow as a young woman in her twenties, who lived to the advanced age of 96. Mrs. Webster was a woman of remarkable personal charm, who, her grandson reports, had received in her young widowhood as many as twenty offers of marriage all of which she declined, "preferring to remain the widow of Ezekiel Webster than to be the wife of any other man." Her influence on the growing Sanborn children, and, for that matter, on the whole Hanover community was profound.

Two daughters and a son of Professor Sanborn grew to mature Mary, later Mrs. Babcock, although her mental capacity was high, was a quiet character, content with a domestic life. Kate (Katherine Abbott) 1837-1917, on the other hand was restless, active and ambitious. A stirring and somewhat unruly child, she absorbed eagerly from her father the instruction coming from his stores of learning, and, in addition, listened avidly to the conversation of the distinguished visitors to the Sanborn home. Very early she began to write, and successfully, so far as publication was concerned. For a time she was an acceptable teacher, among other places as a member of the early faculty of Smith College. All her life she was in steady demand as a lecturer. Possessed of a keen sense of humor, her books abound in clever turns and apt citations, although impaired perhaps by a tendency toward redundancy and lack of logical order. Her true story, Adopting an Abandoned Farm, 1891, and it successor, Abandoning an Adopted Farm, 1894, attained the status of best sellers. Her memory is perpetuated in Hanover by the Kate Sanborn Room in the College Church.

The son, Edwin Webster Sanborn, 1857-1928, entered college in the class of 1877, but by ill health was prevented from graduating until 1878. After a period of teaching he studied law at Columbia and was admitted to the New York

bar in 1882. Carrying on a general practice with a partner for some ten years, he then became associated with the American Agricultural Chemical Company until his retirement in 1913. All his life he was compelled to struggle with ill health, so that he spent much of his time out-of-doors, traveling widely and being especially devoted to fishing, of which art he became an expert. He also wrote many articles for the nature magazines and was the author of one novel, People at Pisgah, which caused something of a scandal in his native town because of the resemblance of some of the characters to former denizens of that community. He had an abundant sense of humor, often whimsical in character, and was an admirable after-dinner speaker. For the last fifteen years of his life he was the victim of a hopeless, progressively increasing malady which finally removed him from all contact with his friends, but through it all he preserved his courage and sense of poise. He died on shipboard, on his way to San Francisco, in 1928.

At the time of his retirement Professor Sanborn's financial condition was precarious in the extreme. In the college archives is a moving letter from his daughter Kate appealing to Trustee Quint that the College make some financial provision for her father and protesting against the brusque manner in which a similar appeal had been rejected by President Bartlett. As a matter of fact, somewhat later relief was in a measure afforded by the provision in the gift of the chapel by Mr. Rollins that an annuity of \$500 should be provided by the College for Professor Sanborn. He did not live long to enjoy it. In later years the fortunes of the Sanborn family notably improved. Kate apparently received a legacy of considerable size, which upon her death in 1917 she left to her brother. This, added to his own accumulations and with careful management of the whole, finally increased to a real fortune. Upon his death the greater part of it was bequeathed to the college, amounting to about \$1,655,000. According to the will a sum not to exceed \$400,000 was set aside for the erection of the English House, \$10,000 was given to the Outing Club, and the remainder was to constitute a fund the income of which should be used for the purchase of books for the library.

Accordingly in 1929-1930 the Sanborn English House was built at an expense of \$344,000. The donor stated that his father was "a living library of learning, but at his best when pouring forth his fund of information in informal talks." It was to preserve this spirit that provision was made for studies (not offices) for members of the English Department, each fitted up and comfortably furnished according to the taste of the occupant. In these studies individual conferences with students, singly or in small groups, could be held in a homelike atmosphere. No recitation or class rooms were made a part of the project but an adequate library for



advanced English students was supplied, as well as suitable provision for assembly purposes. The study of the old professor, the scenic wall paper of the original transferred to it, was reproduced. The fund for the purchase of books, the principal amounting to \$1,400,000, since its receipt has made the Dartmouth library completely adequate for the purpose it is designed to serve. The Sanborn bequest is brought home to each reader by book plates containing a portrait of the professor, inserted in all books purchased from the fund. Certainly no college teacher has been the beneficiary of a more adequate memorial nor one more fully deserved.

#### LAURA A SANBORN & ROSE P SANBORN

Thanks to SFA member Muriel S Parker of Bradford ME for directing me, the Editor, to a web-site with the following 2 Sanborn obits from *The Eastern Gazette* of Dexter ME. The site is www.abbott-library.com. The obits:

"Miss Laura A Sanborn died at Stockton Springs [ME] on October 28, 1946, at the age of 91 years, where she has been cared for at the home of Mrs Seekins for the past three years. She was the daughter of Enoch and Philena Parkman Sanborn and has always lived at the old home on the South Ridge, Dexter, as long as she was able to care for herself. A member of Dexter Grange, Rebecca Lodge and the South Ridge Ladies Social Club. She was the oldest living member of the Free Baptist Church of Dexter. Always ready to help others in her community in times of sickness or death, she will be kindly remembered and greatly missed by all who knew her. She is survived by several cousins and second cousins. Alvin Sanborn, living in France; Charles Q Davis of Dexter; Herbert Parkman of Newport; Frank Brooks of Corinna; Elva Clement of Calais. The funeral was held at the Buxton Funeral Parlors in Corinna on Wednesday at 2 P.M., October 30th, Rev F L Niles officiating. There was a profusion of flowers." The Eastern Gazette [Dexter ME], 7 Nov 1946, p 5.

"Mrs Rose P Sanborn, 86, died Saturday night [23 Sep 1944] in Dexter [ME] at the home of her daughter, Mrs Edgar Atwater, with whom she has lived since the death of her husband Charles Sanborn June 24 of this year. Mrs Sanborn was born in Parkman [ME], a daughter of Jothan and Ruth (Eastman) Harrington. She married Mr Sanborn in early life and their married life was passed in Monson, Willimantic and Guilford. She leaves a daughter, Mrs Edgar Atwater of Dexter; a son Ray Sanborn of Guilford; several grandchildren and great grandchildren; four sisters, Mrs Annie Meserve and Mrs Addie Ham of Guilford and Mrs Lillian Cole and Mrs Edna Carr of Abbot; also one brother, Herbert L Harrington of Guilford. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2

o'clock at Harveys funeral home in Guilford. The Rev Joseph Griffiths officiated. The bearers were four grandsons. Interment was in the family lot at Elmwood cemetery, Guilford." The Eastern Gazette [Dexter ME], 28 Sep 1944, p. 5.

The question arises: can we connect them to the V C Sanborn genealogy? I think we can – certainly for Laura, very likely for Rose.

Regarding Laura A Sanborn, her father is 'Enoch'. In the VCS index there are only 18 Enoch's; of that number probably 5 could be having children circa 1855, when Laura A was born. Twelve were born before 1800 (& thus less likely to be fathering children in 1855) and one born 1854.

(1) Of the 5, one, Enoch Russell Sanborn, fits the geographic location of Dexter ME. He is VCS #1325 ii, born 4 May 1819.
(2) The obit lists Laura's survivors as cousins, including men with surnames of Parkman, Davis, Brooks, & Sanborn (Alvin). According to VCS, Enoch's sisters married a Parkman & a Davis. Enoch also had a brother Alvin (VCS #1907) who had a son Alvin, Harvard grad, 'prolific writer' on economic subjects.
(3) Enoch also had a sister named Laura Ann.

These 3 factors <u>suggest</u> that this is the correct Enoch as father for Laura.

In VCS, Enoch's parents are Peter (VCS #1325) & Sabrina (Russell) Sanborn.

(4) The 1850 census for Corinna, Penobscot County ME (folio 49, house #4, family #4) has Peter as head of the family, with Sabrina & 3 of their children, Enoch R, Martin B, Laura A. This is obviously the same family as in VCS. (5) The 1860 census for Corinna (folio 443B, house #472, family #470) has Enoch R as head of the family, with Philena H, their daughter, Laura A, his parents (a small assumption as there are no family relationship designations in the 1880 census), Peter & Sabrina, and a Clara F Ireland (age 10) [for more on Clara, see below].

This, to me, clinches the question of connecting Laura A Sanborn (d 1946) to the V C Sanborn book. In the 1880 census (page 555C), they are still in Corinna: Enoch R as head, Philena his wife, Laura A his daughter.

The situation regarding Mrs Rose P Sanborn (d 1944) is not quite so clear cut.

(1) In the 1880 census the only Rose Sanborn in ME is Rose P Sanborn (age 22), wife of Charles (age 24), with daughters Eva M & Ida N in Elliottsville, Piscataquis County ME (folio 149C). This fits the obit for her name, her age in 1880, her husband's name, and the correct region in ME. (2) There are 22 Charles's in the VCS index born 1850-59. The best possibility is VCS #1133 i (i), Charles A (b 11 Feb 1856), son of Jonathan G (VCS #1133 i; b 27 Feb 1830), son



of James (VCS #1133) & Clarissa (Gordon) Sanborn. Charles (b 1856) also has a sister, Helen E (b 1857) according to VCS. (3) The 1850 census of Vienna, Kennebec County ME (house #86, family #91), has the James Sanborn family: James (age 42), Clarissa, Jonathan (age 20) & 3 other children who are all in VCS. (4) In the 1880 census is Jonathan G Sanburn [sic] (widower, age 50) with 3 daughters, including Helen E (age 22), in Abbott, Piscataquis County ME (folio 89B). Nearby in the 1880 census is the Charles Sanborn family [see (1) above].

It seems to me that the connection between the James Sanborn family in 1850 & the Jonathan G Sanborn family in the 1880 is quite certain – name & age match VCS data, Jonathan's daughter, Helen E, is there – thus this Jonathan G is the son of James. It is a little less certain (though I am convinced he is) that Charles Sanborn (& his family) in 1880 is the Charles, son of Jonathan G, in VCS, and the same Charles, husband of Rose P Sanborn, referred to in the above obituary.

As a footnote, I investigated who the Clara F Ireland (age 10) was in the 1860 census of the Enoch & Philena Sanborn family. The marriage records of Penobscot County ME (roll 3, v2, p 76) include a marriage on 12 Sep 1848 between Philena Parkman of Corinna & John B Ireland of Newport ME. In the 1850 census for Newport, Philena Ireland (age 28) is head of a family with a single child Clara F Ireland (age 6?/12). This Clara F Ireland was married to a George W Sawtelle of Shirley ME on 2 July 1879 in Penobscot County (roll 4, b 6, p 512). George & Clara then appear in the 1880 census for Shirley with no children, both adults aged 30. It appears to me that Clara was the child of Philena's first marriage, the stepdaughter of Enoch R Sanborn.

More research could easily be done on these two families. A quick look at the Maine State Archives web site's marriage index indicates that Eva M Sanborn married Edgar J Atwater 18 Sep 1900; and that Ida N Sanborn married Joseph S Basket 14 Nov 1901. There are unlikely to be descendents of Enoch R Sanborn but there obviously are for Charles & Rose P Sanborn. I wonder if any of them are members of the SFA?

#### **EARLY SANBORNS**

#### Willis H Sanborn

Email correspondent David Antonson of St Paul MN kindly sent the editor a 1928 obituary of his great grandfather, W H Sanborn. The following is from the *Anoka County Union IMNI*, 14 Nov 1928.

"W.H. Sanborn Anoka Pioneer Dies Suddenly. Resident of Anoka Forty Years Succumbs to Acute Heart Trouble. Former Town Clerk of Columbus Township. Born in Parsonsfield, Maine, Seventy-eight Years Ago — Six Children Survive.

Willis H. Sanborn, a resident of Anoka forty years and a pioneer in this section of the state, passed away Monday afternoon [12 Nov 1928] suddenly from an acute heart attack. Mr. Sanborn was about as usual during the morning, attended to things at the house. About one o'clock he complained to his daughter, Maebelle, of a severe pain in his back near his shoulder blades. He laid down on the couch and his daughter heard him gasp and he was dead when she reached his side.

Mr. Sanborn was born in Parsonsfield, Maine, December 13, 1850. He attended school in Maine and in Massachusetts and in 1870 came to Forest Lake, Minnesota. He was postmaster there one term, and then moved to Columbus, Anoka county, where he was town clerk and a member of the school board. He returned to Forest Lake and about forty years ago moved to Anoka. Mr. Sanborn was married to Dora Koch at Wyoming in 1875 and she died June 20, 1885. Six children are living: Clara E. Hardy, Fifty Lakes, Minn.; Beatrice A. Sanborn, Anoka; Winnie R. Clark, Superior, Wis.; Alice H. Splittstoser, Minneapolis; Maebelle and Clarence Henry, Anoka.

When a boy Mr. Sanborn attended the Baptist church, and funeral services will be held from the home this afternoon at two o'clock, Rev. L.R. Hall, officiating.

Mr. Sanborn was a carpenter by trade, and he was a conscientious and skilled workman, doing what he had to do to the best of his ability. He had been downtown daily, walking back and forth, and enjoyed greeting his many friends. He took a great interest in politics and national events and was particularly well read. Meeting the writer Friday he expressed a wish that when his time came to cross the great divide, that he might go quickly and without suffering. That wish was granted him."

#### Robert D Sanborn

Bev Davidson of Clallam Co WA found, by chance, the gravestone of Sergeant Robert D Sanborn in Ocean View Cemetery, Clallam Co WA. He served in the Civil War in the 6th Vermont Infantry, Co E & Co K. The Clallam County Pioneer listed his death at 26 Jul 1909. Bev would be glad to take a photo of the gravestone for any interested person. She can be

[Editor's note: a quick look in VCSanborn didn't show any likely Robert's. The 1880 census had no Robert Sanborns in VT. In the western states in 1880 there was only one Robert Sanborn. In fact, a Robert D Sanborn, unmarried, age 35, a city constable, living in what looks like a small boarding house in Vallejo, Solano County CA. I wonder if this is the same one buried in the state of Washington?]

#### SANBORNS IN THE NEWS

Arianna Sanborn, of Machias ME, earned "High Honors" in the 3rd quarter of the 2001-2 school year. She was enrolled in the 4th grade at Rose M Gaffney School, Machias ME. Machias Valley News Observer, I May 2002.

Greg Sanborn of the Merrill ME area had his photo in the Bangor [ME] Daily News (4 July 2002, p B2). As a game warden he was helping the Maine State Police search for three suspects in a Merrill burglary.

In a follow-up to the news item on the oil spill in Sep 2001 in Sanborn Pond, in Brooks, Waldo Co ME, [see Sanborn Signatures, Fall 2001, p 7] the Bangor Daily News (6 Jul 2002, pp C1 & C8) reported that the oil is still surfacing. The reporter primarily interviewed Art Green whose lake camp was demolished when the oil truck skidded from the road avoiding a deer, ran thru his camp, and into the lake. 5,600 gallons of industrial fuel spilled; officials estimated they cleaned up 85% of that but that some of the oil formed tar balls that sank. Those tar balls will probably keep surfacing for several years and no long-term impact can be done for 3-5 years.

Bev Davidson of the State of Washington reported that thanks to Ardith James's contact with Muriel Tinkham (town historian of Springfield NH), Muriel "made arrangements with Bill Anderson of the Pleasant View Cemetery to re-position the headstones of Abraham Sanborn [VCSanborn #357] & wife Sarah Emerson Sanborn, as they were both falling over."

Thanks to Duane Crabtree for sending on an article about Alan Sanborn in the Waterville [ME] Morning Sentinel, 19 Jul 2002. Alan is the 'Fix it man' at the Maine International Film Festival being held at Sanborn's Railroad Square Cinema in Waterville. He is responsible for all the equipment & showing the film & videos to the audiences. The article gives his background, love of film, & how involved his entire family has been.

### Oliver & Betsey (McKenney) Sanborn

Barbara Brooks is interested in finding other descendants of Oliver & Betsey (McKenney) Sanborn (in VCSanborn he is #380 ii). The 1880 census for Stetson, Penobscot Co ME has Oliver's family: he, wife Betsey, & children Willie (10), Fannie F R (8), & Bennie F (6). Willie (of Foxcroft ME) married Lena Webber (of St Albans ME) on 13 April 1901 – they are Barb's grandparents. Bennie F (of Dexter) married Cora Gilman (of Parkman) on 26 Oct 1901.

Willie & Lena (Webber) Sanborn had 5 children: William (Barb's father), Percy, Ralph, Clyde, & Ada. Barb reported that Ralph & Ada had no children and that Clyde lost touch with the family. Percy married at least twice: the first was to Annie L (b ME circa 1906), the 2nd was to Rosie M (Robinson) Durgin (of Portland ME) on 10 April 1955. According to the 1930 census (Augusta, Kennebec Co, ME, ED #2, p 31A), Percy P & Annie L had 2 children: Percy P Jr (b ME circa 1924) & Richard (b ME circa 1925). According to the Social Security Death Index, Percy Sr died in Dec 1978, probably in Westerly RI; Rose M (Robinson) Sanborn also died in RI in July 1993. The Westerly RI city directories show they lived in Westerly in 1960 & 1967-78, Rose remaining there to her death in 1993. Percy Sr worked at Electric Boat in Groton CT & also for Mystic Seaport (Mystic CT).

So the questions are: does anyone have knowledge of descendants of Percy Sr & Clyde – both sons of Willie & Lena Sanborn? Does anyone have knowledge of descendants of the earlier generation – Bennie F Sanborn & Fannie F R Sanborn – both children of Oliver & Betsey Sanborn? ## Joel Sawyer Sanborn

Denise Sanborn Schoo is trying to find the parents/siblings of her great great grandfather, **Joel Sawyer Sanborn** (20 Aug 1821 – 24 Feb 1867), possibly born in Great Falls NH, who died in Tamworth NH. He seems to have been known by his middle name, 'Sawyer'.

He married first, Dorothy Young, 4 Jan 1845, & they are in the 1850 census in Somersworth, Strafford Co NH. Do not know what happened to Dorothy.

He married second, Sarah E (Roberts) Lowe (widow of Nehemiah Lowe, 2 sons, Jewett & Frank W Lowe) on 14 Jul 1857 in Somersworth.

Joel & Sarah had 2 children: George Lowe Sanborn (3 Feb 1858 – 24 Jan 1938) & Willie R Sanborn (29 May 1861 – 16 Jun 1864). Joel, Sarah, George Sanborn & Frank Lowe are in the 1860 census in Tamworth, Carroll Co NH.

Joel enlisted as a Private 26 Jul 1862 at age 40 in Company C, 11th Infantry Regiment NH. He was mustered out 4 Jun 1865 in Alexandria VA.

Joel is buried with his son, Willie, in the Tamworth town cemetery. In the 1860 census the family is living in Tamworth among several Sanborn's but I cannot find anything that proves relationship. I have a copy of the marriage certificate & the parents' names are not listed. There is no birth or death certificate in the town of Tamworth or in the state Archives. I have copies of Sarah's pension application, but no relationships are mentioned. I have not located a will, but have found that he owned property in Tamworth, Great Falls, & Nashua.

I have copies of land transactions: (1) 1844 Mercy Sanborn to Joel S Sanborn, 1 Jun 1844, Tamworth, Carroll Co NH – Land Deed. Lot #16, seventh range of lots in Tamworth, Joel S Sanborn ?? and will maintain the said Mercy Sanborn & William Sanborn & their minor children in the above described premises with all the necessary comforts of life during the natural lifetime of the said Mercy & William & the said minor children until they arrive to the age of 21. Signed by Mercy & William Sanborn [Editor's note: William is #768 v in V C Sanborn]. (2) 1846 Joel S Sanborn to William Sanborn, 18 Sep 1846, Tamworth, Carroll Co NH – Land Deed. Lot #16, seventh range of lots in Tamworth. Signed by Joel & Dorothy Sanborn.

This seems to indicate that Joel 5 Sanborn is the son of William & Mercy (Sawyer) Sanborn but have found nothing to really prove this. I have not found a will for William Sanborn. SANBORN, Daniel S. [Editor's note: the following is an article by reporter Eric Pera of *The Ledger*, with some paragraphing changed.] Lakeland FL — Daniel Starr Sanborn Sr., who chronicled much of Lakeland's history with camera, microphone and pen, died in his sleep Wednesday [4 April 2001] morning of an apparent heart attack. He was 85. A New York native and Lakeland resident since the age of 10, Sanborn's career spanned nearly 60 years, including stints as a Ledger newspaper reporter and photographer, advertising executive, cable news entrepreneur and radio news director.

The Lakeland Public Library's Special Collections unit includes more than 6,000 photograph negatives and 800 prints – a pictorial diary in black-and-white of the city's early days seen through Sanborn's lens. The collection's earliest Sanborn photograph is of Polk County pioneer and former Florida Gov. Park Trammell's 1936 funeral at a Lakeland cemetery. "Dan told me that the first photo he actually sold was the coffin photo," said Kevin Logan, special collections curator. "He certainly was one of the chroniclers of Lakeland history over the last 50 or 60 years."

Sanborn's brother, Harold, owned and operated a camera shop at Massachusetts Avenue and Orange Street in downtown Lakeland for many years before it was razed as part of the city's long-range restoration plan. Dan Sanborn caught the camera bug as a cub reporter at the Lakeland Evening Ledger and Star-Telegram. Fresh out of Lakeland High School, Sanborn earned \$3 a week as the newspaper's sole reporter, covering municipal government, crime and the Chamber of Commerce. He taught himself to shoot and develop pictures, and used a 50-pound block of ice and fan to stay cool in the newspaper's airtight darkroom.

Over the years, Sanborn interviewed and photographed dozens of the city's historical events, landmarks and star visitors, from Ku Klux Klan rallies to Florida Southern College designer Frank Lloyd Wright and automobile magnate Henry Ford.

In a 1999 interview with Ledger editors and photographers, Sanborn recalled how, in the late 1930s, he obtained an exclusive interview with Ford, who was staying at the New Florida Hotel, now the Regency Tower. At the time, Ford was in his 70s and rarely granted interviews. Urged by his editor to give it a try, Sanborn waited for the industrialist and his wife to approach the hotel dining room for lunch. The fledgling reporter decided to get to Ford through his wife, Clara. "I said, Mrs. Ford, I know Mr. Ford's on vacation, but I would appreciate just a few minutes for an interview. I'm new on the paper, and it would help me out. She turned around to Henry and said, 'Now this young man has been polite, he hasn't been intrusive. Now Henry, you come over here and sit down and talk." Sanborn was happiest behind a camera, said his son, Ken, 47, of Sarasota.

Dan Sanborn left *The Ledger* in 1941 to work in public relations for the Lodwick School of Aeronautics in Lakeland, which trained American and British fighter pilots for World War II. A year later he joined the Navy and served for three years in the Tampa naval intelligence office. Next came stints as a commercial photographer and advertising executive. In 1960, Sanborn was hired as news director at WONN-AM radio and stayed 22 years.

WONN's morning man, Dick Goleno, began his radio career as Sanborn's assistant. He said his boss was a taskmaster who thought nothing of waking a reporter at 2 a.m. to cover a fire in Haines City or airplane crash in Lake Wales. Together, with then station owner Duane McConnell, Sanborn operated Lakeland's first cable television news station, CATV, from WONN's basement. "Not that many people were watching," Goleno said, "but Dan thought that was NBC. Boy, we had to put ties on and the whole stuff. He was the No. 1 news person in Polk County for years," Goleno said. "I admired Dan Sanborn. He was gung ho."

In addition to his son, Sanborn is survived by his wife, Elsa; son, Daniel Jr. of Tampa; and daughters, Priscilla Block of West Palm Beach and Suzanne Jewett of Atlanta; seven grandchildren; and one great-grandchild.

A funeral service will be held Saturday at 11 a.m. at All Saints Episcopal Church in Lakeland. A reception will follow at the Lakeland Public Library. The Ledger [Lakeland FL], online edition, 6 April 2001. [see Harold Sanborn obituary below]
